NEW CLASSES

Beginning in January 2017, Creative Arts will offer four classes for area children across a wide range of ages and interests. The schedule includes Elementary Art, Toddler Music, Creative Movement, and a "Try Us" School of Ballet class.

Elementary Art is a new class designed for 1st through 5th grade students

to learn basic art concepts. Students will work with watercolors, chalk, oil pastels, pencil, marker, and clay to create projects they will be proud to share. In addition to gaining knowledge about various visual art forms, students will increase their creativity, listening, and problem-solving skills.

Classes will be taught by instructor Emily Roop and will meet four Thursday evenings from 5:00-6:30 beginning January 12. Tuition for the four-week session is \$65, which includes the cost of all supplies.

Children ages 18 months to three years and their parent/guardian will use voice, movement, and rhythm instruments in Toddler Music. Students in this class will learn the basic foundations of music and rhythm while developing listening, decision making, and turn-taking skills. This class highlights the importance of parent/child bonding. Instructor Amy Chaplin will be teaching each Monday morning from 10:30 to 11:00 for eight weeks beginning January 9. The tuition for the program is \$64 with a sibling tuition rate of \$58.

Creative Movement is designed for preschool-aged children to learn about dance and movement in a fun, educational environment. Children ages four and five years old will develop

rhythm, coordination, and motor skills, as well as listening and social skills. The class meets for ten weeks beginning the week of January 9. There are two class sessions from which to choose – Tuesday afternoon from 4:30-5:15 and Thursday mornings from 10:00-10:45. Tuition for the ten-week session is \$120. Creative Movement students will have the opportunity to perform in a mid-semester performance in February.

At the halfway point of the current School of Ballet season, a special open-enrollment "Try Us" ballet class will take place on Thursday, January 5 from 5:00-6:00 pm. Regardless of previous experience, children ages 5-14 years old are encouraged to attend this class to learn more about the School of Ballet program. This is a FREE class, but pre-registration is required.

the Scholar Success Program. These are just some examples of school counselors helping students thrive. Yet many Indiana students are at a critical disadvantage—there is not enough counseling time to reach every student who needs it.

The Center for Education Statistics ranked Indiana 42nd in the nation for having one counselor for every 541 students in 2013. The American School Counselor Association (ASCA) recommends a 250:1 student-to-counselor ratio. But Indiana Department of Education (IDOE) data showed in September 2016 that for every 619 students, Indiana had just one licensed counselor.

This is not just a state-level problem. In Huntington County, the data from IDOE shows there is one licensed counselor for every 357 students, with 15 licensed counselors in the Huntington County Community School Corporation.

ASCA identifies three essential areas where counselors can support student success: academic performance, college and career preparation and social/emotional development. Many schools report success with their academic counseling efforts, which can cover traditional counseling activities such as course selection or study skills, but the highest need lies in the areas of college and career preparation and social/emotional issues.

For example, school counselors assist students with family issues such as divorce and deaths of loved ones, managing emotions, resolving conflict, and learning interpersonal skills. Counselors help students with bullying, drug abuse and mental health issues in an era when nearly one in five Indiana high schools students have considered suicide — tied for the third highest rate in a national survey.

Dr. Michele Moore, superintendent for the Metropolitan School District of Martinsville, says the number of students needing assistance with social/emotional issues continues to increase. Her district's eight licensed counselors are "putting out brush fires that have to be immediately taken care of." In recent years, counselors have seen more students dealing with parents who are incarcerated or addicted to heroin/opioids. It is easy to understand how student achievement and success can be sidetracked by these complicated issues. School counselors are uniquely trained and qualified to help students cope with these situations.

School counselors know that student academic and social/emotional well-being are interconnected and critical to long-term achievement. Counselors play a key role in career development, helping students at every education level understand the link between school and work opportunities, while also

guiding students toward college and career transitions. The Indiana Department of Workforce Development reports that Indiana will need to fill one million jobs by 2025. Mark Friedmeyer, president of the Indiana School Counselors Association, says counselors need to start the career readiness process at the elementary and middle school levels. "If they wait until they get to high school to learn about that then that may be too late," he says.

A comprehensive counseling approach provides adequate time for counselors to address all three critical areas with all of the students they serve. Recognizing the increasingly complex challenges schools and students face, a groundbreaking new effort from Lilly Endowment Inc. will address the academic, college and career, and social-emotional needs of students. Through grants to public school districts and charter schools, the Endowment's new five-year, \$30 million initiative will help schools better meet students' needs for comprehensive school counseling.

This grant is both an exceptional opportunity and a sizeable challenge. That's why the Indiana Youth Institute was asked to assist school districts with the planning, implementation, evaluation and sustainability of their initiatives. Once again, we are reminded that student well-being and achievement is a shared responsibility of schools, families and the community.

Financial aid professionals will be volunteering at Ivy Tech, Fort Wayne and 39 other sites in Indiana to help college-bound students and their families open the door to financial aid during College Goal Sunday. The event is set for 2 p.m. (local time), November 13, 2016.

The free program assists Indiana students in filing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA form is required for students to be considered for federal and state grants, scholarships and student loans at most colleges, universities and vocational/technical schools nationwide. The FAFSA MUST be filed by March 10 to be eligible for Indiana financial aid. College Goal Sunday is so important since completing this required form correctly and by the deadline is sometimes perceived to be complicated and time consuming. In less than one afternoon at a College Goal Sunday event, students and their families can get free help and file the form online.

Now in its 28th year, College Goal Sunday has helped more than 90,000 Indiana students and families

complete the FAFSA properly and on time. College Goal Sunday is a charitable program of the Indiana Student Financial Aid Association (ISFAA).

College Goal Sunday Doubles the Help Offered

"With the FAFSA start date moving forward from January to October, College Goal Sunday made the decision to add a November event in addition to the traditional February event," said Bill Wozniak, co-chair of College Goal Sunday. "Now there will be two College Goal Sunday events across Indiana to help families file the FAFSA, and bring students one step closer to fulfilling their educational goals."

According to the Indiana Commission for Higher Education, programs like College Goal Sunday are reaching first-generation college students. In recent years, according to CHE statistics, more single-parent Hoosier families have filed for financial aid, indicating programs like College Goal Sunday are reaching high-risk students and their families.

"Students who don't complete their financial aid paperwork properly and on time are often very disappointed when they find out how much financial aid they lost," said Wozniak. "This is why the Indiana Student Financial Aid Association not only continues to provide College Goal Sunday, but added a second event this year. If our assistance gives students a better chance at higher education and less debt, we're fulfilling our mission."

What students should bring

Students should attend College Goal Sunday with their parent(s) or guardian(s), and parents' should bring completed 2015 IRS 1040 tax returns, W-2 Forms and other 2015 income and benefits information. Students who worked last year should bring their income information as well. Students 24 years of age or older may attend alone and bring their own completed 2015 IRS 1040 tax

return, W-2 Form or other 2015 income and benefits information. Students and parents are encouraged to apply for their U.S. Department of Education FSA IDs at fsaid.ed.gov before coming to the event.

Volunteers will walk through the online form line-by-line and answer families' individual questions as needed. All sites offer FAFSA online capabilities and many have Spanish interpreters. A complete list of sites is available at CollegeGoalSunday.org.

Attendees may win educational prizes

Students may also win one of ten \$1000 scholarships. Students who attend any of the College Goal Sunday sites and submit a completed evaluation form will automatically be entered in a drawing for a \$1000 scholarship. The winners will be notified in December, and prizes will be sent directly to the higher education institution selected by the winning students.

21st Century Scholars benefit

21st Century Scholars are income-eligible students who sign a contract in the seventh or eighth grade promising they will graduate from high school, meet grade point requirements, fulfill a pledge of good citizenship, and apply for college financial aid. Upon high school graduation, Scholars who have fulfilled the commitment receive state funds to help cover their college tuition and fees for eight semesters at eligible Indiana colleges. To fulfill their pledge, scholars must submit a completed FAFSA form on time. College Goal Sunday can help.

Program is a national model originated right here in Indiana, and is now a national model. Following Indiana's example, College Goal Sunday events organized by more than 34 states have opened doors to higher education for hundreds of thousands of students all over the country.
