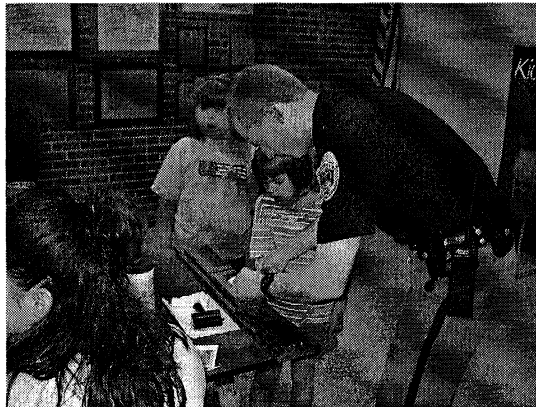

## COUNCIL NOTES

In honor of Municipal Government Week the Warren Town Council held a special meeting at Salamonie School on Tuesday afternoon, May 1. President Harold Jones called the meeting to order at 2 p.m. with the Pledge to the American flag.

Members of the seventh and eighth grade classes were allowed to sit in on the meeting and were later invited to participate.

President Jones introduced Council and explained duties of the Council.

Minutes of the April 23 meeting were approved as submitted.

Council signed easements for utilities for phase two and three at Langton Estates. There are 46 lots in the subdivision. Utility layouts are expected to be available soon for the town.

The Town of Warren has been selected as one of eight communities in the State to participate in a computer program. Because of a virus, Council agreed to purchase an anti-virus software to update on viruses.

Town-Clerk Marilyn Morrison had attended a State Board of Accounts School in South Bend

and submitted a written report to Council.

It was announced the State Curfew Law will go into effect as soon as it is signed by the Governor which is expected soon.

Council voted to pay \$400 membership fee in CSO partnership which includes 107 communities in the State. This is the third year Warren has been a member.

Given the opportunity to ask questions and make suggestions, the students participated and showed a definite interest in the community.

In answer to a question about new bleachers at Tower Park, Council said new bleachers have been installed at a cost of \$10,000. There are new bleachers at each of the two ball-diamonds and ground work around them is expected to be completed soon.

Suggestions from students included a Skate Board Park, swimming pool at Tower Park, and better drinking fountains at the Park.

In response to a suggestion to clean the ball diamonds it was reported this was on a list compiled for improvements at the Park. The students asked about non-working score boards at the Park. Council said the score boards are owned by Pepsi Cola and they had tried in the past to get them repaired, but this had failed to materialize. Council indicated they may find another source to rectify the situation.

A bike path was suggested and Council indicated they would check on the matter.

Better batting cages were suggested, but Council said they are owned by the Baseball Association. Council also agreed to check on the situation.

It was suggested that sidewalks need to be repaired in town. Students were advised that property owners are responsible for sidewalks in front of their properties and that there is financial help available for replacement projects.

Because of the State Highway in the downtown area the Department of Transportation would be contacted for improvements of sidewalks and curbs in that area.

It was suggested to have better upkeep of restrooms at Tower Park. In order to avoid vandalism the rest rooms be locked at night and Police patrol the Park area.

It was suggested to install a graffiti wall that could be repainted. Students were informed there is a contest to name both ball diamonds at the Park.

Rest rooms at the Park should be repainted because of graffiti. Again, Council stated that vandalism was a major problem.

A student asked about better basketball courts. It was indicated people take the nets.

In response to a suggestion for chain nets at the basketball court,

## AREA NEWS CONTINUED

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Council said they were not allowed due to liability to the town in case of an injury.

Officer Donnelly told students curfew time is currently 10 p.m. weeknights and 11 p.m. weekends. Those 16-18 years, curfew is 12 a.m.

Students suggested cameras be installed as a possible way of catching those disfiguring public property. Citation was also a possibility.

Someone asked what the consequences is for vandalism. They were advised \$25 fine the first time, \$50 for second offense, and \$100 for third offense if they are caught three times in the same year. Vandalism can also be treated as a misdemeanor under Indiana State Law.

Better tennis nets at the Park were recommended. Council said they are in the process of trying to find ways to improve the Courts.

### VB COUNCIL

On Wednesday evening, May 2, the Van Buren Town Council met in the Council Room at Town Hall. At 7 p.m. president Tony Manry called the meeting to order and all in attendance repeated the Pledge to the American flag.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as submitted.

Officer Pat Collins gave the Police report. Both vehicles were said to be running well.

A list of junk and abandoned vehicles had been compiled and letters were expected to be sent to owners.

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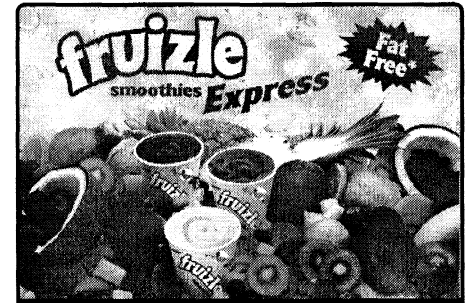

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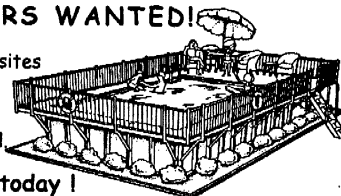
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
