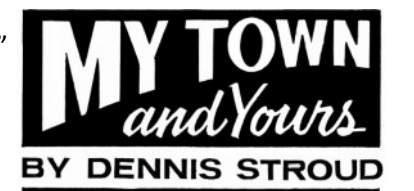
VETERANS MEAL

his employer. After working in that shop for several years he moved to a building on first street. He continued there until he purchased a lot on Wayne Street and built a brick building, where Napa is today. Mr. Christy was in business for nearly 50 years. In 1895, the lot on the southwest corner of First and Wayne Street was deeded to Mr. Christy. This was when the present structure was built by Mr. Christy. The architect was George Franklin Barber. Most of Mr. Barbers Queen Anne Style were of framed construction but this one was construction of brick. All the inside walls were several bricks thick; the windows are of beveled glass with several unique shaped windows, namely the oval one in the entrance hall and the horseshoe shaped one on the second floor facing Wayne Street. There were three fireplaces on the first floor and the house was originally lit with gas lamps. In 1909, the house was deeded by James and Mary Christy to William D. Bonifield and after his death, his wife Emma, deeded it to her heirs. Three of her children continued to live in Warren, Harry Bonifield, Dr. Mack Bonifield and Mrs. Helen Tam. In 1955, the property was deeded to the Methodist Memorial Home. It first became a funeral home in 1953 and was operated by Bruce Brown for a short time. It was soon purchased by Floyd and Helen Grogg and became the Grogg Funeral Home. In 1963, the place was purchased by Thomas and Patricia Butler who continued as the Butler Funeral Home.

CHAUTAUQUA

"Whatever you do, do it With Excellence!" That is the mission of operation of the Bread of Life Food Pantry in the Warren area, according to Director Rose Broyles. The number one object of the Food Pantry is to Feed the Children. Every child receives their own food bag when coming by in the Drive-through lane at Knight Center. This new operation is the result of the Covid pandemic.

Anyone may come with giving only their names and number in the family.

The number two of the Pantry is to help people "get better." One of the ways to do this is to give "substance food" -- food that is good for your growth and good health.

At the present time there have been 59 families from Warren, and 105 families from the Huntington and outlying area.

The given food is provided through Government subsidies, and all items must be edible.

The third major items provided are hygiene items NOT supplied by the government subsidies, but by the Communities at large. There are 12 Churches that

participate, but 7 of the Churches rotate their services with the direction of the Warren Ministerial Association. Also, many individual families, groups, clubs, and community friends volunteer their services of all kinds.

The hygiene items contributed and so necessary are TP, diapers, shampoos, bar soap, body wash, tooth brushes, tooth paste, band aids, and any items necessary for good healthy living. Some people plant gardens specifically for fresh and healthy foods for the Pantry to give away. People can also help by VOLUNTEERING for an hour or two at times, searching for grants, giving Christmas items, giving time to help with organizing items. Purdue Extension gives many suggestions to help people get assistance for taxes, heat, making payments for utility bills, providing cooking and sewing classes, and budgeting ideas from the Dave Ramsey organization if necessary.

All the efforts made by both the Pantry and Communities are ways to help people go from point A to point B---to Live with Hope, and to feel secure. The Churches have said they will never let the Food Pantry run out of money to help the Community!

What a Blessing to be a member in this Community where there is so much love, compassion, and desire to help others whenever there is a need. Have you met Rose Broyles yet? She can help you grow in your efforts to do your part as a concerned citizen. And find a spot for you to do your part for even an hour or two some week.

* Review your business structure. If you go into business as a sole proprietor, you'll have to report your business income on your personal income tax return. If you incorporate or form a limited liability company (LLC), you can protect your personal assets – such as your house and your investments – from creditors because these assets will be separated from your business assets and debts. You might also consider other, more complex entities, known as C and S corporations.
