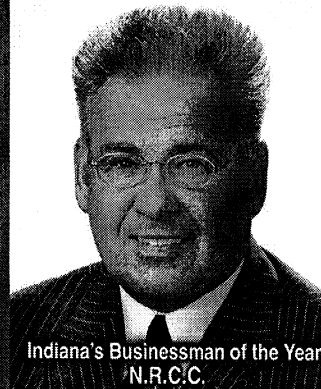

AWARDED BRONZE STAR
Huntington resident, Army National Guard Sgt. 1st Class Charles T. Applegate Jr., was presented with the Bronze Star Medal on Sunday, March 14 in a special ceremony at the Fort Wayne Armory, for his efforts last year while deployed to Kuwait and Iraq as the Medical Platoon Sergeant.

At least fifteen other members of the 1-293d Infantry Battalion were also presented with the coveted medal at the National Guard Armory, located at 130 Cook Road in Fort Wayne. The battalion was, at the time, the largest reserve unit deployed to the Middle East and was the first infantry National Guard battalion activated since the Korean War.

The citation accompanying Applegate's Bronze Star Medal outlined the fact that he was instrumental in the training of over 100 combat lifesavers (infantry squad members trained to perform routine emergency medical treatment) prior to the deployment of the battalion, and that he managed multiple medical facilities which, at any given time, were the only medical treatment facilities for over 10,000 in-theater service personnel in the Tallil Air Base area. His battalion and outlying medical aid stations treated many times that number of military personnel during their time in Kuwait and Iraq, and was referred to by one visiting brigadier general as, "The best field medical facility" he had seen in his entire military career. The battalion returned to Indiana last November.

Applegate, while proud of his selection to receive the Bronze

Star Medal, said, "This is a great honor for me, but, while I was responsible for the concept of the operation and drew up the plans, it was the highly motivated and well-trained men in my Medical Platoon who executed the plan and made it work. Without them, it would have just been a good plan on paper."

He resides in Huntington with his wife, Patricia, and three daughters, Amber, Megan and Paige. He is the son of Louise and Tom Applegate of Warren.

THERE IS A TIME FOR REGRET, A TIME TO LET GO

There are people who refuse to forgive someone who hurt them. And, oddly, there are people who refuse to forgive themselves for a regrettable action.

Fred Luskin, Ph.D., says the main obstacle to self-forgiveness is a need to feel the guilt. Instead of taking responsibility for their actions, people may punish themselves by feeling miserable, sometimes for years.

That decision affects others. Luskin, director of the Stanford University Forgiveness Project, says people close to them also suffer because the miserable person is often withdrawn and critical.

There is a time for regret, but after that it's time to move on. Luskin recommends:

- Do a reality check. If the regret is for something you didn't do, look at the situation realistically. Decide whether there was something you actually could have done, and whether it was the right thing to do.

- Realize that what you regret is not what's making you feel awful. It's your reaction to thinking about it again and again.

- Decide to put it aside. When you find yourself replaying your "sins" in your mind, stop! Refocus your attention on something more positive or pleasant.

- Practice PERT, Luskin's acronym for Positive Emotion Refocusing Technique. It takes only 45 seconds and can be used whenever you start beating yourself up. Close your eyes, draw in a long breath that gently pushes out your belly, then slowly exhale as you relax your belly. Then draw

another breath and slowly release it.

Learn to be thankful. In his book *Forgive for Good* (Harper San Francisco) Luskin suggests being thankful for the abundance of food when you're at the supermarket and being thankful for your good health when visiting a hospital. Give thanks for good drivers when you're on the road and thank

your significant other for caring about you every day.

Be thankful each morning for the gift of your life for another day.

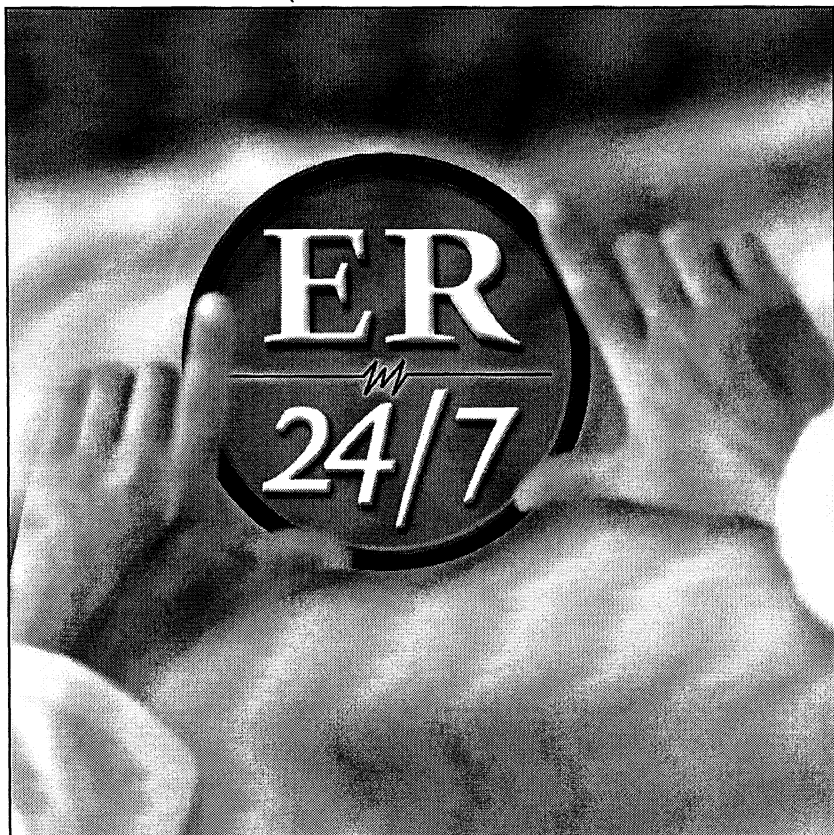
4-H ENROLLMENT DUE APR 1
