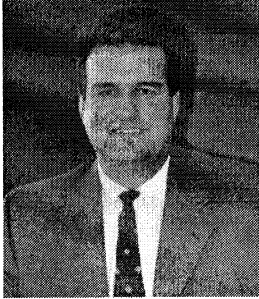

DANGEROUS VIRUS ALERT

(Editors Note: this information was forwarded to the Warren Weekly via e-mail. WW has not verified the authenticity of this information. The original message was signed by Mrs. Sandra Dee McNair-Boyd, Social Work Secretary, Yale New Haven Hospital, Department of Social Work 203/688-2256.)

"This is from Schwab Corporate Headquarters - so it's no joke. Very scary.

Be careful. Just when you thought you were safe, now we have the following to deal with ... please read, it definitely is a serious threat to our lives and health. This is an alert about a virus in the original sense of the word ... one that affects your body, not your hard drive.

There have been 23 confirmed cases of people attacked by the Klingerman Virus, a virus that arrives in your real mail box, not your e-mail in box. Someone has been mailing large blue envelopes, seemingly at random, to people inside the US. On the front of the envelope in bold black letters is printed, "A gift for you from the Klingerman Foundation." When the envelopes are opened, there is a small sponge sealed in plastic. This sponge carries what has come to be known as the Klingerman Virus, as public health officials state this is a strain of virus they have not previously encountered.

When asked for comment, Florida police Sergeant Stetson said, "We are working with the CDC and the USPS, but have so

far been unable to track down the origins of these letters. The return addresses have all been different, and we are certain a remailing service is being used, making our jobs that much more difficult.

Those who have come in contact with the Klingerman Virus have been hospitalized with severe dysentery. So far, seven of the victims have died. There is no legitimate Klingerman Foundation mailing unsolicited gifts. If you receive an oversized blue envelope in the mail marked "A gift from the Klingerman Foundation." DO NOT open it. Place it in a strong plastic bag or container and call the police immediately. The "gift" is one you definitely do not want to open."

GED TESTS CHANGING

The GED tests are changing. Adults who didn't graduate from high school will want to take the test before it changes at the end of the year. High school graduation requirements have increased since the current test was introduced in 1988 and to reflect those changes the new GED will be more challenging.

For Indiana residents who plan to take the old test there is one last opportunity to study from home on public television. GED ON TV will begin taking enrollments for the spring semester January 16, 2001. To enroll, call toll-free 1-877-GEDONTV. Nearly 6,000 Hoosier adults have earned an Indiana GED High School Diploma after studying with the GED ON TV series. The five month series covers the reading, writing, social studies, science and math skills needed to pass the current GED test.

When an adult calls to enroll they will be mailed a packet of information. The \$26 course fee covers the cost of three GED ON TV workbooks, pre-tests, newsletters, post-tests and a toll-free Helpline. By watching two lessons each week and completing the workbooks, the student will earn a voucher that will pay the cost of taking the GED test at any Indiana testing site.

Adults who want to enroll should call right away so that there will be time to mail the pretests and ship the workbooks before the broadcasts begin. GED ON TV is a

partnership of the Indiana Public Television stations, the Indiana Department of Education, and the Muncie Community Schools. For information about enrolling in GED ON TV adults may call 1-877-GEDONTV (433-6688).

PLATES DISCONTINUED

INDIANAPOUS - The Bureau of Motor Vehicles has discontinued the sale of four special recognition license plates which did not meet mandatory sales requirements.

Indiana Code requires each organization that is issued a special recognition license plate to sell a minimum of 500 license plates within the plate's first year of availability.

The Indiana Code citation below applies to any organization that qualified for a special recognition license plate after Dec. 31, 1999 and before Jan. 1, 2001.

Indiana Code 9-18-25-16 states, "(b) The bureau shall terminate the organization's qualification for the special group license plate program and no further special group recognition license plates shall be issued for the organization if less than five hundred (500) of the organization's special group license plates are sold or renewed before January 1 2001."

The following organizations did not meet the statutory sales requirements:

- Drug-Free Indiana Trust "Chances for Youth"
- Indiana Food Banks Trust
- Indiana Girl Scouts Trust
- Indiana Metal Health Trust

"The BMV appreciates the recognition these organizations' license plates have given our special plate program and their departure from our program in no way diminishes these organizations' important roles in society," said BMV Commissioner Gary A. Gibson.

Those motorists who currently have one of the discontinued special recognition license plates can renew them until 2002. Beginning with the new license plate cycle in 2002 these motorists will be required to purchase a new plate during their regular renewal month.

ER TO RELOCATE

Wells Community Hospital Emergency Department to Relocate February 1; Other Inpatient Departments by February 5

Hospital officials announced today that as of February 1, 2001, the emergency department of the current Wells Community Hospital will consolidate with and relocate to the current Caylor-Nickel Medical Center.

Located in Bluffton, Wells Community Hospital (the "south campus") and Caylor-Nickel Medical Center (the "downtown campus") are currently merging all services and creating one health care system. The emergency department is the first acute care area to consolidate, and will be followed almost immediately by obstetrics and inpatient medical/surgical services. A new name for the consolidated entity will be unveiled by early spring at the latest.

"Anyone requiring emergency care on or after February 1 will need to be seen at the downtown campus," explained Tom Clark, CEO of Wells Community Hospital and COO of Bluffton's consolidated health system. "But you'll still see the same familiar faces, as well as a few new faces, because associates from both the south and the downtown campuses will work in the new emergency department." Physicians providing emergency care will include Drs. Richard Jaskiewicz, Larry Jones and Ashish Khemka. Clark pointed out that whether visits to the emergency department are for minor health

**TEEN DANGERS:
 DRUGS, MIXED MESSAGES, SUICIDE RISK MAKE
 TEEN YEARS LIKE WALKING A TIGHTROPE**

Professionals who work with at-risk youth say one problem with teens lies in the values of society. Even within individual families, values aren't consistent. Some things are accepted in a certain period or culture, while at other times they are not. Popular opinion on acceptable behavior has always been fluid, says Anotal Etziont, a sociologist at George Washington University. But while society may not be consistent, parents should be. Let kids know you realize they're getting different information, and that it's OK to come to you with questions. But wait for them to ask you for information.

Many studies show that parents are the most important influence on a child. Take every opportunity to discuss such matters as smoking, drugs, out-of-wedlock pregnancy, and depression. It may not appear that teens are listening, but they are watching you and listening to you.

How do you know the difference between normal teen rebellion and indications that something is seriously wrong? Dr. David Shaffer of Columbia University says you have a clue when questionable behavior spills outside the home. Shaffer, president of the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, recommends watching for changes: too much or too little sleep, falling grades, loss of interest in life.

Note that 12 percent of all deaths among people aged 10 to 24 are caused by suicide.

Today, teens have many opportunities for losing their way. They have the time and money for vices. They have less supervision at home, and they see; a distorted version of life on TV.

Some kids are resilient and can bounce back from adversity and disappointment. Others make choices that are life-altering. That's why you have to pay attention.

concerns or a condition requiring a hospital stay, each patient's personal physician remains the same. In other words, while a patient will see an emergency medicine physician during a visit to the ER, any follow-up care, including hospital stays, will be referred to the patient's personal physician.

"The consolidation of these emergency departments blends two rich traditions into a single source for emergency care," stated William F. Brockmann, CEO of Caylor-Nickel Medical Center and Bluffton's consolidated health system. "This is our first step toward consolidation of all acute care and outpatient services into a new health care entity. We anticipate that obstetrics, as well as medical/surgical services, will be consolidated and relocated to the downtown campus as of February 5."

"We are very pleased to make these announcements," Brockmann continued. "We recognize that our consolidation has been months in the making and appreciate the ongoing support of our patients, as well as the communities we serve. This support, coupled with the teamwork exhibited by our associates and our medical staff, is helping us realize our goal of creating a consolidated health care entity."

Based on licensing regulations, physical size and the need for patient care services to be readily available in one facility, acute care services will be housed at the downtown campus. Outpatient services, home health care, the fitness center, education and business offices will be located at the south campus.

4-H GUN SAFETY

Firearm safety instruction, handling procedures and hands-on experience will once again be included in this year's Wells County 4-H BB Gun and .22 Caliber Rifle Safety Program.

Meetings will begin on Tuesday, February 6 with sign up from 6:30 - 7:30 PM. Meetings will continue each Tuesday, February 13, 20, 27 and March 6, 13, 20, 27 and April 3. Awards Night will be April 10.

All meetings (except February 6) will begin at 6:30 PM and end at 8:30 PM. The Wells County Community Center at the 4-H Park in Bluffton will be the location for all meetings.

For safety reasons and to produce adequate instruction enrollment this year will be limited to 36 youth in BB Gun and 32 youth in Rifle. Sign up will be on a first come first serve basis.

Youth in grades 3, 4, and 5 will participate in BB Gun. Youth in grade 6 and above may participate in Rifle. First time members (new to the Club) who are old enough for Rifle will be required to pass a BB Gun shooting skills proficiency test which reviews the positions and range safety procedures.

Youth may become 4-H members when they enter third grade or become ten (10) years of age sometime during the calendar year (January 1 - December 31) and may continue their membership for a maximum of ten years or through the calendar year they become nineteen (19), whichever comes first.

A membership fee of \$15 for BB Gun and \$20 for .22 Caliber Rifle

should be paid at the first meeting. The fee covers the cost of equipment, materials, ammunition, insurance and awards.

Members are not allowed to bring their own equipment. Advanced registration is not required. Sign up will be at the first meeting. All participants must have a completed and signed health form before participating in the hands-on activities.

NURSE ANESTHETIST WEEK

Caylor-Nickel Medical Center and Wells Community Hospital will join other health care facilities around the country in celebrating National Nurse Anesthetists Week, January 21-27. "Nurse Anesthetists have been providing high-quality anesthesia care for more than 100 years," said Karen Tower, Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist (CRNA) at Caylor-Nickel Medical Center. "CRNAs administer to the patient's physical and emotional needs, offer reassurance and comfort, and stay right by the patient's side throughout the surgery. These are the hallmarks of a CRNA."

Caylor-Nickel Medical Center and Wells Community Hospital utilize CRNAs during surgical and obstetrical procedures. Karen Tower and Chuck Flinko, both CRNAs, provide patient care in surgical and obstetrical services at Caylor-Nickel Medical Center and Wells Community Hospital. Joining them this month will be David Shepherd. CRNAs provide different types of anesthesia services depending on the type of surgical procedure that a patient is undergoing. In addition, anesthesia is available to obstetrical patients desiring pain management during labor.

A minimum of 7 years of education and training is involved in the preparation of a CRNA. As advanced practice nurses, CRNAs receive their specialty anesthesia education from one of approximately 90 accredited programs offering a master's degree. After graduation from an accredited program of nurse anesthesia education, each individual must successfully pass a national certification exam. To maintain certifi-

cation, CRNAs are required to complete 40 hours of continuing education every two years.

CRNAs practice in every setting in which anesthesia is delivered, including traditional hospital surgical suites, obstetrical delivery rooms, physicians' offices and ambulatory surgical centers. In fact, CRNAs deliver 65 percent of the 26 million anesthetics given to patients annually in the United States. Locally, the anesthesia departments are comprised of anesthesiologists Hak-sun Bak, M.D., Robert Steckbeck, M.D., and John Martig, D.O. and CRNAs Tower, Shepherd and Flinko.

SHOOTING SPORTS

The Huntington County 4-H SAFE/Shooting Sports program will start on Sunday, January 28, 2001. HAT- READY TO ROLL

The HAT-Huntington Area Transportation: "county-wide transportation for everyone" will start operating January 5, 2001. This service will provide affordable, reliable transportation for everyone regardless of age. It could be to places of employment, a ride to get children to child-care, trips to the doctor's office or hospital, trips for shopping, or a visit to Aunt Sue.

The Council on Aging is receiving a grant through the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) to assist in funding public transportation. Local money from the city of Huntington, Huntington County Commissioners, United Way, and local donations will be used to match the INDOT grant money to provide this service.

For those over 60 years old, they will continue to have the service available on a donation basis only. Those under 60 will be charged a fare. For one way trips within the city of Huntington the cost is \$1 per trip. Those within an 8-mile radius from Huntington will be charged \$2 per trip. And those beyond the 8-mile radius will be charged \$3 per trip. To save even more money, transit passes are available. For a \$10 pass the rider will actually get \$12 value or for a \$20 pass the value is actually \$25. These can be purchased from the HAT office located at the Senior Center at 646 Guilford Street. The drivers will also have these available.

It is important to realize that the HAT service is not a taxi service. It is necessary to make reservations 24 hours in advance. Reservations can be made by calling 356-3006 Monday-Friday between 8:00-4:00. It is also possible to have regularly scheduled trips such as to work. Just call the HAT office at 356-3006 and set up the schedule.

TOYS & DOLLS

An extensive collection of antique toys and dolls are on display at the Huntington County Historical Museum. Antique dolls have been loaned by Mary Welches and include an 1860's china head doll, a rare penny head doll representative of a type that originated more than 200 years ago, a metal head doll made in Germany in 1907, a bisque doll from the 1930's and a composition baby from the 1940's. A large number of home-

made toys have been loaned from the collection of Ray PeGan. They include a wooden sword, ca. 1900 which was found hidden in the rafters of a milk house in Huntington County, a 1920's wooden steam tractor assembled from crate lumber, kindling and salvaged hardware, several sock monkeys, and a novelty pig made by tile factory workers. A wooden train, bi-plane, puzzles, stick horses and other folk art items reflect the ingenuity of people in finding ways to keep children entertained in earlier years when money was not available. Toys from the turn-of-the-century from the collect of Jean Germand include a Noah's ark, iron banks, soldier blocks, doll furniture, tops, a mechanical cat and chicken, a small sewing machine made in

Germany, and other books and games. This temporary exhibit will be on display through February. The museum is located at 315 Court Street and is open from Tuesday - Friday 10-4 and Saturday from 1-4. Group tours and meetings are welcome. For more information call 219/356-7264.

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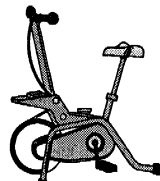
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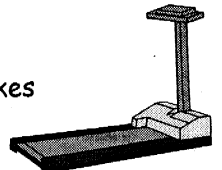

IN E-PAY

For the first time, Hoosier taxpayers who owe state income tax can pay the amount owed electronically, either over the telephone or over the Internet with any of four major credit cards: MasterCard, Visa, American Express or Discover Card.

The Indiana Department of Revenue has added this new method of payment as a convenience to Hoosier taxpayers and in an effort to keep pace with new computer technology that makes it possible. Previously, the Department accepted only one form of credit card that required keypunching credit card information from paper returns, which was a slower and less accurate process.

The Indiana Department of Revenue's new IN E-Pay allows taxpayers to pay both their individual income taxes or bills owed to the Department. They can either call a toll-free telephone number, 1-866-729-4682, from a touch-tone telephone and follow the detailed instructions — OR — they can pay directly over the Internet at the following web address: <http://www.state.in.us/dor/epay>.

If making an individual tax payment, the following information is needed: Social Security Number, Spouse's Social Security Number, Credit card number and expiration date, Amount to be paid.

If paying a bill to the Department, the following information is needed: Taxpayer Identification Number, Liability or Case Number, Credit card number and expiration date, Amount to be paid.

During the transaction, credit card holders will be told the amount of the convenience fee being charged by the credit card processor and given the option of either canceling or continuing the credit card transaction at that time. The fee is based on the amount being charged.

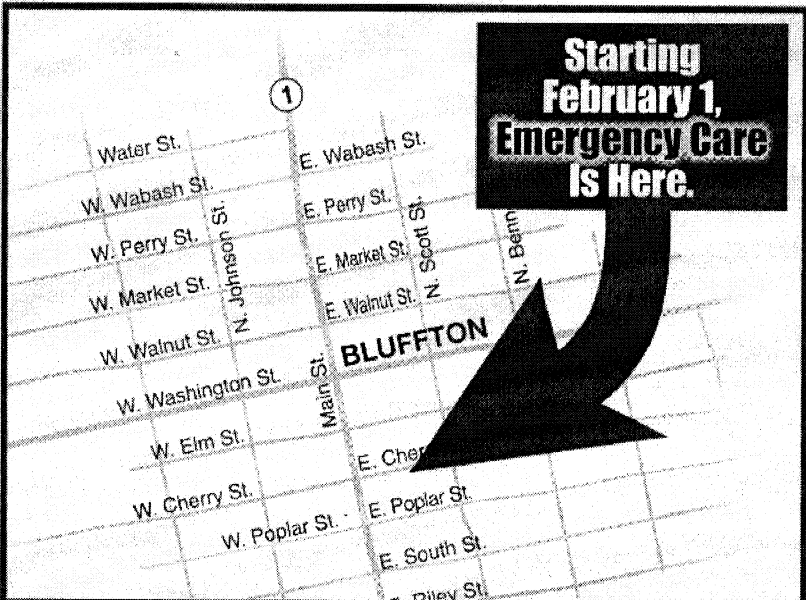
