Treva's
Recipe Box

Memorial Day weekend I had Kylynn over for the whole weekend. She helped with putting the flags out at the cemetery and a few other odd and end jobs. She is such a great help.

Ky loves to bake and cook (I wonder where she gets that from) so she made her cookies that she was wanting to make, Starchies and they do live up to their name, but they were kinda good. Definitely not as good as peanut butter or chocolate chip, but very different. There was only cornstarch, sweet, condensed milk and butter. I believe if we added some almond flavoring in them then they might be pretty good. Her next project is not one I really care for, but she wants to make a Shoofly pie. I really want to talk her out of it, but we will see.

When Kylynn decided to take a nap, I fixed one of my favorite meals which was Grilled Italian chicken, lemon red potatoes, and cabbage casserole. It's all pretty simple to make, but I started my chicken since it was frozen the day before and marinated it in Italian dressing, flipping it over every so often so it marinated both sides of the chicken breast.

My lemon red potatoes were 1½ lbs of red potatoes washed and trimmed. I cut them in halves and quarters. I boiled them in water till done, drained and made a sauce out of ¼ c. butter melted and added 2 tbsp parsley, 1 tbsp lemon juice, 1 tbsp chopped chives and salt and pepper to taste.

Now to tell you about the good stuff, cabbage casserole. Now I will be the first to admit this it's not as good as Mrs. Kreigbaum's au gratin cabbage but it is pretty good and hits the spot.

CABBAGE CASSEROLE

1 Lg head of cabbage, chopped in to bite size
6 tbsp butter, divided
1 med. onion, chopped
1 can of cream of mushroom soup, undiluted
8 oz. Velveeta cheese, cubed
salt and pepper to taste
1/4c. dry bread crumbs

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cook cabbage in boiling water until tender. drain thoroughly. In a large skillet melt 5 tbsp butter over medium heat. Cook onions and stir until tender, 5-7 minutes. Reduce to low. Stir in soup. Add cheese stir until melted. Remove from heat stir in cabbage and salt and pepper.

Transfer to an ungreased 2 qt baking dish. Melt the remaining tablespoon of butter and mix with the breadcrumbs.

ceremony for the overall winners will begin at 9:45 a.m. with age category winners to follow.

The top three Males and Females in the 5K will receive an award.

There will also be awards for the top 3 males and females in each age group.

PHOTO CONTEST

During the month of June, the Indiana State Department of Agriculture will accept submissions for the 18th annual Indiana Agriculture Photo Contest. The contest is open to all Indiana residents and was created to recognize the hard work and contributions of Hoosier farmers, as well as the beauty of the state's agricultural landscape.

"We hope Hoosiers will take this opportunity to highlight Indiana agriculture and display the beauty of the state," said Lt. Gov. Micah Beckwith, Indiana's Secretary of Agriculture and Rural Development.

Participants are encouraged to submit photos reflecting the wide array of agriculture. The categories photos can be entered under are:

* On the Farm: Showcasing any building, piece of equipment or activity that is a part of life on an Indiana farm.

* Faces of Agriculture: Featuring those who grow and produce food, fuel and fiber in Indiana.

* Agritourism: Spotlighting Indiana's seasonal and agricultural destinations, such as orchards, wineries and farmers markets.

* Conservation: Highlighting Indiana's natural beauty with landscapes, water and wildlife.

In total, ten winners will be selected: two from each category and two overall.

Winners will be invited to attend a special ceremony at the Indiana State Fair, where they will be recognized and receive certificates from Lt. Gov. Beckwith and Indiana State Department of Agriculture Director Don Lamb. Contest winners will also have their photographs featured in the offices of the Lt. Governor's Family of Business in Indianapolis throughout the year.

"Indiana agriculture makes an impact on a global level," Lamb said. "We are excited to see photos of the work behind the scenes and the hands that feed us each day."

Contestants can submit up to five photos in digital format accommodated by a submission form for each photo. Photos will be evaluated based on creativity, composition and category representation. Entries must be submitted by 5:00 p.m. (ET) on June 30, 2025.

PURDUE FORT WAYNE TO HOST FREE, ONLINE CONFERENCE FOR INDIANA K-12 EDUCATORS

Purdue University Fort Wayne is hosting a free, online conference for K-12 educators in Indiana to help them earn Professional Growth Plan points needed for license renewal. programs, who introduced the idea in December during a lunch with Brad Oliver, chair of counseling and graduate education. Shane Conwell, clinical assistant professor of educational leadership, joined the discussion in April.

"It really helps that we have a lot of instructors who are experts in their fields," Cashdollar said. "The great thing about the different topics is that they are really of the moment, so they pertain to what teachers are doing now and what would interest them and help them."

Oliver recruited the seven speakers, including Conwell, who will discuss the role of educators in school safety, and Isabel Nunez, dean of PFW's School of Education, who will welcome participants to the event.

"What excites me most about INnovatED is its focus on practical, classroom-ready innovation," said Erin Hayden, clinical assistant professor, who will present Literacy Rewired: Innovating Reading Instruction for Content-Area Classrooms. "It's not just about ideas—it's about actionable strategies that empower educators to reimagine what's possible in their classrooms. The energy around this event is contagious, and I think that's why Brad Oliver was able to gather such a strong slate of speakers so quickly."

Other breakout sessions include:

- * Luminous: Learning and Understanding Mathematics Integration Opportunities Using STEM

- * Autism Unpacked: Insights for Inclusive Educators

The event will be presented via Zoom, and time has been allotted throughout the day for questions.

Cashdollar said if there's a good response, it's possible the professional learning summit could be offered again in the near future. Potential

speakers have already expressed interest in participating.

The Second Chance Initiative, a partnership of the Volunteer Center and the Volunteer Lawyer Program, offers individuals that meet qualification requirements the opportunity to have their Indiana conviction records expunged.

Volunteer Center Executive Director Ani Etter states, "A criminal record is one of the largest obstacles to better housing, employment, and education. The Second Chance Initiative provides a door to better opportunities for the future."

Paul was blessed to marry into a big family, that eventually became his own family that loved him dearly

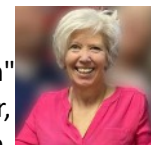

SOCIAL SECURITY MATTERS

Ask Rusty – Will "DOGE" Hurt our Social Security or Medicare Benefits?

Dear Rusty: I am a new AMAC member and have an important question for you, and your answer will be greatly appreciated. My question is: Is the new DOGE effort going to help us, or hurt us, all those living on Social Security and receiving Medicare benefits? Please let us know soon. Regards: Worried Senior

Dear Worried Senior: Here at the AMAC Foundation, we offer free access to everyone, the public as well as AMAC members, for our acclaimed Social Security Advisory Service, at which we answer all inquiries from anyone with questions about Social Security and enrollment in Medicare. As you can imagine, we very closely watch all action in Washington, D.C. which will affect Social Security and Medicare, especially any Congressional legislation being considered.

The new "DOGE" (Department of Government Efficiency) organization is tasked with uncovering and eliminating fraud and waste in all areas of the Federal Government, and that includes Social Security and Medicare. But the important thing to remember is that DOGE is seeking only to discover fraud and government waste.

Recently a great deal of visibility has been given to DOGE's efforts to discover potential fraud (and waste) in the Social Security Administration. Everything we have seen thus far indicates that DOGE's efforts have identified opportunities for reducing fraud and waste at the Social Security Administration, so our expectation is that DOGE's efforts will tend to help the Social Security Administration become more efficient but not

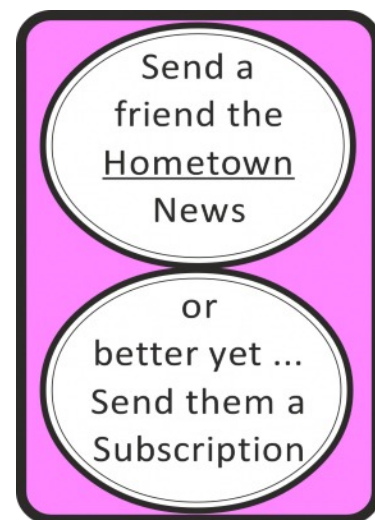
endanger anyone's Social Security benefits. Indeed, President Trump and the DOGE team have repeatedly said that no cuts in Social Security benefits will occur as a result of DOGE's efforts. Reducing fraud and waste at the SSA would tend to improve the agency's financial posture and improve their ability to pay full benefits longer. The same is true for Medicare. Actually, DOGE is very transparent and posts everything they find on this website: www.doge.gov. A quick look at this website reveals that none of what they have found at the SSA indicates any threat to SS or Medicare benefits.

I suggest that any negative news media and social media accounts of DOGE's activities be taken with a grain of salt. All such articles are largely meant to attract attention to unlikely "doomsday" scenarios. The reality is that our government is over \$36 trillion in debt, and that debt is growing, which is an unsustainable financial path for our country. DOGE is specifically tasked with eliminating the deficit gap by reducing frivolous government spending and fraud. But reducing crucial benefits for seniors on Social Security and Medicare are NOT part of DOGE's efforts, nor their goal.

Rest assured that here at the AMAC Foundation we are

watching all current DOGE efforts very closely and will vigorously oppose anything which will negatively affect Social Security and Medicare. Indeed, AMAC's stated goal is to strengthen and preserve Social Security for all future generations.
