The Fire Insurance Classification for the Town of Warren has been improved to a Class 7 from a Class 8 following evaluation of the Warren Volunteer Fire Department and Town of Warren water supply, and hydrant flow, conducted by Insurance Services. This change may result in a decrease in property insurance coverage calculations for residents in the Town. Therefore, policy holders should contact their agent or company to determine if this change in classification will effect premium costs for coverage.

FARM MANAGEMENT TOUR

The Indiana Farm Management Tour will be on July 5 and 6 this year. The tour will be on the western side of the state in Tippecanoe, White, Jasper, and Newton Counties. The schedule for the tour and maps to the different locations are available from the Grant County Extension Service

This tour is an excellent oppor-

tunity to look at different farm management practices on five different farms. The way that the tour is set up you can participate in all of the tour sites or only go to the sites that interest you.

TOP FARMER WORKSHOP

The annual Top Farmer Workshop will be on the Purdue University campus July 17, 18, and 19 this year. The Extension Service has information on this program and registration forms.

The theme for this workshop is how do you and I use our resources to add value to our lives. In our business, how do we add value? This is a question each of the fifty speakers have been ask to consider as they present their message at this workshop. This workshop will help you consider opportunities for how you can add value. I'm concerned about the threat that many farmers will become serfs, as they perform fewer highly valued jobs.

BABYSITTER'S PROGRAM

To help improve the safety of young children left in the care of adolescents, the Huntington County Chapter is offering the Babysitters Training program. The course instructs youth on how to care for infant through schoolage children by teaching them how to prevent injuries and what to do if an emergency arises. The U S Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates that each year nearly two million children through the age of eight receive emergency room treatment for injuries related to consumer products and recreational activities around the house.

The American Red Cross Babysitter's Training, an 8 hour class, is written and designed for youth age 11-15. It provides adolescents with a range of injury prevention, first aid, and basic child care skills. Participants work on projects such as identifying safety problems around the house and the yard, and selecting appropriate toys and games for children of various ages.

"The Red Cross is offering babysitter's training not only to equip youth with the knowledge of how to keep children and themselves safe but also to give parents the peace of mind they need when leaving their children at home with a sitter," said Douglas

Hatfield of the Huntington County Red Cross. "With more then 85 years of experience in educating millions of people on health and safety, our national headquarters decided to work with chapters from around the country' and experts in the field to develop this nationally standardized course to keep our children safe."

The babysitter's Training Class will be offered on Saturdays, July 8 & 15, 2000 from 8-12 p.m. at the Knight Civic Center in Warren. The charge is \$20 per participant. Registration and payment are needed by Wednesday, July 5.

FOURTH OF JULY 2000

Declaration signers pledged all for freedom

America's founding fathers faced a dangerous future when they signed the Declaration of Independence in 1776. Before them was an explosive confrontation with one of the world's mightiest powers.

Eventually, some of the signers would lose their lives in the war of revolution. Others would suffer the loss of their families, their security, and their fortunes. But they valued liberty above material things and personal safety. They pledged:

"For the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of the Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor."

Few Americans are aware of the sacrifices they made. According to historians for the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW):

Nine of the 56 signers fought and died from wounds in the war or shortly thereafter. Five signers were captured by the enemy as traitors and were tortured before they were killed. More than one lost his wife and mother of his children in the war. Two lost sons, and the sons of two others were captured.

Twelve had their homes ransacked or burned. Several lost personal fortunes in the war and died penniless.

According to VFW, signer John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and his grist mill were burned. Hart survived more than a year in the forest until the enemy retreated. He returned to find his wife dead and his children vanished. He died of exhaustion and a broken heart.

Quoting from a sermon delivered by the Rev. Frederick Trumbore, the VFW notes that the experiences of Declaration signers Philip Livingston and Lewis Morris of New York were tragically similar to

They were selfless, these lawyers, businessmen, and farmers. While we do not know the fate of every signer of the Declaration of Independence, we do know that many paid a very dear price for our freedom.

VB COUNCIL NOTES

A number of citizens were in attendance at the regular meeting of the Van Buren Town Council on Wednesday evening, June 21. President Tony Manry called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. and all in attendance repeated the Pledge to the American flag.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as submitted. A citizen in attendance complained about conditions at 505 South First Street. They reported trash in the yard and the grass is only mowed occasionally.

Another citizen complained about a dog on South First Street which is penned in a small muddy area and often fed on the ground. The area has become infested with rats and the complaining citizen said they had to call in an exterminator because the rats had worked their way onto his property, and into his house. The exterminator said the rats may be results of conditions around the dog. It was also reported that



because the area is not cleaned around the dog, there is a foul odor. It was noted that there is a Town Ordinance concerning odor.

A resident recently purchased some ground adjacent to their property. They had talked to their Attorney about vacating an alley. Council agreed they could fence the area and put up a gate.

Officer Pat Collins gave his report and noted both police vehicles were running well.

Deputy Meyer was expected to return to duty on Friday June 23. He had been off duty due to a foot injury.

Council was informed that parents are thrilled with the new playground equipment at the Park, but there are no benches for them to sit on while children play. Council plans to make benches available and to fence in the area.

The Park pavilion is being painted and roofed

Engineer Ken Smith gave his report to Council on various projects.

Superintendent Jim Webb reported all water meters had been read and water tests done for June.

West Vine Street had been excavated.

The water meter at 104 East Plum Street has been covered, making it impossible to read the meter.

The next meeting will be held on Wednesday evening, July 5.

Now the next question has to be.... Who can I vote for? Well, here they are in no apparent order.....


