PIONEER FESTIVAL

The vintage tractors and bicycles on display at the Forks of the Wabash Pioneer Festival Sept. 24 and 25 will take to the streets during and just prior to the festival.

Fans of the old-time machines are invited to see them in action and, in the case of the tractors, get an up-close look in advance of the festival.

Two antique tractor drives will take place on Friday, Sept. 23. Both start and end at the festival grounds at Hier's Park and the Huntington County Fairgrounds.

At 10:15 a.m. on Sept. 23, the tractors will leave the fairgrounds and drive to Andrews via Briant Street, State Street, Warren Street, Park Drive and River Road. They will return to the fairgrounds via Old Andrews Road, Waterworks Road and Evergreen Road.

At 5:15 p.m. the same day, tractors will leave the fairgrounds and drive to the Huntington County Courthouse via Briant Street and Warren Street. The tractors will be parked around the courthouse for a couple of hours, starting up again at 7:15 p.m. to return to

the fairgrounds via Jefferson Street.

Antique bicycle riders will go out for a 10-mile spin on Sunday, Sept. 24, at 10 a.m.

The riders will leave the fairgrounds at Taylor and Garfield streets and head out Riverside Drive to CR 200E (Simpson Road), taking a left on State Street and returning to the fairgrounds on Briant Street, Riverside Drive and Garfield Street.

Organizer Brenda Rittenhouse says she expects seven to 10 riders to participate, many riding the old-fashioned high wheel bicycles. Others will be riding safeties, similar in appearance to the bicycles of today.

This year's ride is dedicated to the memory of Rittenhouse's late husband, Ray Rittenhouse. Ray and Brenda have organized the antique bicycle display at the Pioneer Festival for many years. Ray became ill just before last year's festival and lost his battle with cancer on Dec. 15 of last year.

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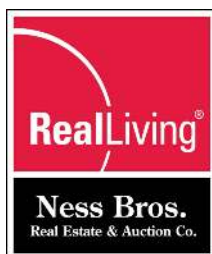

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Hunters can apply online for a reserved hunt by visiting hunting.IN.gov and clicking on the "Reserved Hunt Info" link.
The online method is the only way to apply.

Applicants must possess a hunting license valid for the hunt for which they are applying.
To be accepted, applications must be completed by the application deadline.

Hunters will be selected through a computerized, random drawing. Drawing results will be posted at wildlife.IN.gov within two weeks after application deadlines, and an email will be sent to applicants when results are posted. Applications are currently open for:

—Waterfowl hunt draw: Application must be completed by Sept 26. Applicants may choose up to five property and date combinations. Properties are Brookville and Monroe lakes, Goose Pond, LaSalle, Hovey, Kankakee, Kingsbury and Willow Slough fish & wildlife areas, and Province Pond Wetland Conservation Area. Successfully drawn applicants will be chosen for one (or more) of their five property and date choices. Participants must have a party of three hunters to hunt Monroe Lake. On all other properties, hunters must be accompanied by at least one but no more than two other hunters.

—Pheasant put-n-take hunts: Application must be submitted by midnight on Nov. 30. There is a \$28 per person fee to participate. Properties are Atterbury, Glendale, J.E. Roush Lake, Pigeon River (west of State Road 3), Tri-County, Willow Slough and Winamac fish & wildlife areas.

—Bluffs of Beaver Bend Nature Preserve deer hunts: Applications must be

submitted by Sept 26. Two hunts are available: a firearms hunt, Nov. 19-20; and a muzzleloader hunt, Dec. 10-11. Applicants are allowed to apply for themselves and one hunting partner. Deer harvested at this hunt are part of the hunter's statewide bag limit. Bonus antlerless licenses can be used. Martin County has a bonus antlerless county quota of four.

Only one application per hunt is allowed. No changes can be made once the application is submitted.
