who passed the recipe to you, ethnicity (if relevant), number of years the recipe has been in your family and any interesting information about it's place in your family's traditions. Note, the history accounts for 50% of the score so be sure to do justice to your recipe's story.

For examples please consult [www.greatermidwestfoodways.com](http://www.greatermidwestfoodways.com) under the "events" tab for examples.

5. The recipe must be prepared for judging exactly as described in the recipe.

This will be 40% of the score. The entire loaf, pie, cake or brownies must be entered. If cookies or individual items are entered 10 must be entered. A sample will be added to your display for the viewing of the entries. If product needs refrigeration, please pack in cooler to keep cool till judging.

6. Each entry will be shown in a display. Your product should be displayed simply though attractively, with the use of props. Such as a framed copy of the original recipe, photographs, placemats, napkins, glassware or flowers. Make it look like you remember it as being displayed in your family but keep it simple. You will have up to a 14" x24" space for your display. 10% of score comes from display.

7. On every paper entered in the contest, please write your name on the back of the paper.

8. This is going to be a closed judging. The Judges decisions are final and awards will be given to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place.

9. All recipes will be published in the Salamonie Summer Festival Cookbook which will be available in July of 2024, along with the Warren Weekly, with a short history with the recipe.

10. Entries are to be brought to the Exchange (PNC Bank Building) on Thursday, June 29th from 11 am to 1pm. Displays will be available for viewing after the Parade on June 29th and all day Saturday with pick up

being between 6-8 pm on Saturday night, July 1st.

Gov. Eric Holcomb declared May 20 as Kids to Parks Day in Indiana and signed an official proclamation that acknowledges the important initiative to "encourage kids and empower families to get outdoors and visit America's parks."

The day is a chance for children to learn about park stewardship, outdoor recreation, and natural and cultural history. It also helps foster an appreciation for public lands in the next generation.

Special events are taking place at state parks throughout Indiana.

**BEWARE OF CYBER ATTACKS**

Attorney General Todd Rokita today warned Hoosiers to be alert to the possible rising incidence of cyberattacks on churches and other nonprofit organizations.

"Hackers regularly carry out attacks on companies and governmental offices," Attorney General Rokita said. "Now, though, we're seeing signs that cybercriminals are expanding their lists of targets."

On April 30, data extortioners struck a national Catholic publishing house based in Huntington, Indiana — one day after a ransomware group attacked an evangelical megachurch in South Carolina.

"Nothing is sacred to these high-tech outlaws," Attorney General Rokita said. "Our

own office and law enforcement agencies nationwide are working to bring offenders to justice. At the same time, we encourage all Indiana institutions, as well as everyday Hoosiers, to take proactive steps to implement cybersecurity measures.”

Attorney General Rokita offered the following tips:

- \* Be on alert for communications with dangerous attachments or fraudulent links.

- \* Always verify the email addresses of those who send you emails.

- \* Don't reveal personal or financial information via email or text message.

- \* Encourage regular and updated cyberattack training for organizations' employees, members and volunteers.

- \* Ensure that your organization has updated appropriate software patches and that it monitors current schemes and scams by hackers.

- \* Avoid using gift cards, money orders or cryptocurrency to conduct transactions or regular organization business.

### INDY 500 TICKET SCAMS

Attorney General Todd Rokita warns Hoosiers of crafty scammers before heading to the greatest spectacle in

racing – the Indy 500. Large sporting events often attract con artists who can trick even the most experienced fans.

“As Indiana prepares for thousands of race fans, I encourage Hoosiers to exercise caution before purchasing their tickets, paying for parking, or making any online reservations,” Attorney General Rokita said. “If you believe you’ve been scammed, please contact my office to file a complaint.”

Many counterfeit passes and tickets appear to be authentic, but track staffers can spot a fake right away. In the past, race fans have made it all the way to the gate and then turned away for fake parking passes or tickets. If the deals sound too good to be true, it usually is.

Attorney General Rokita offers the following tips to avoid scams during this year's race, including the Grand Prix this weekend:

- \* Purchase items directly from IMS whenever possible.

- \* Consider your source. Know the difference between a professional ticket broker (a legitimate and accredited reseller), a ticket scalper (an unregulated and unlicensed ticket seller), and a scammer selling scam tickets.

- \* Know the refund policy. You should only purchase tickets from a ticket reseller that provides clear details

about the terms of the transaction.

- \* Use payment methods that come with protection. Always use a credit card so you may have some recourse if the tickets are not as promised.

- \* Call the hotel directly before your trip to let them know you're on the way.

- \* Check the reviews for the hotel or wherever you're staying.

- \* Look for warning signs, like prices that seem a little too low or website addresses that seem odd.

- \* Get email confirmations for all reservations and tickets.

Hoosiers are encouraged to contact the Office of the Indiana Attorney General regarding any suspected scams or scam attempts. You can file a complaint online by visiting [indianaconsumer.com](http://indianaconsumer.com) or by calling 1-800-382-5516.

### VOTER LIST MAINTENANCE

Hoosier voters will be receiving postcards in the mail from the Secretary of State's Election Division. The mailings are part of a statewide voter list maintenance. The goal is to identify outdated, duplicate, and inaccurate voter registrations to improve the accuracy and integrity of Indiana's voter registration list.

You don't have to do anything in response to receiving a postcard. If a postcard is returned by the Post Office as undeliverable, a second postcard will be sent to the forwardable address on file with the US

Postal Service. The second postcard will ask the voter to confirm or update their residence address or cancel their Indiana voter registration using a postage pre-paid voter response card. Hoosiers who receive a second postcard should follow the instructions to complete and return the pre-addressed, postage-paid response card to the Secretary of State Election Division.

This process required by federal and state law is part of ongoing effort to identify outdated, duplicate, and inaccurate voter registrations.

A registration “flagged” as inaccurate by this process can only be canceled by a county voter registration board if the “flagged” registration is not utilized for voting in two successive federal elections. Voters can correct or update a “flagged” registration by mail, in-person at their county clerk's office, or at the polls when they vote in a Primary or General Election.

“One of my top priorities is to clean the voter rolls. These postcards help ensure more accurate voter registration lists on a county and statewide level. This update will give us a clearer picture of voter turnout and protecting the integrity of our elections,” said Indiana Secretary of State Diego Morales. “As Indiana's Chief Elections Officer, I am committed to making sure Hoosiers are confident at the polls. We will continue to look for creative ways for voters to update their registration.”

These mailings should also serve as a reminder for Hoosiers to verify, update or start a voter registration online at <http://www.indianavoters.com>. Voters can also visit their county clerk's office to register or update their voter registration. An image of a sample postcard can be found online.

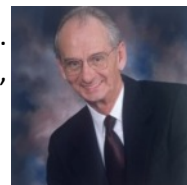

**A BUS TRIP TO HHI, SAVANNAH, & CHARLESTON DAY # 3, PART 2**

As soon as the bus left our hotel to tour the remainder of the island, we passed Coligny Plaza and turned northward towards Palmetto Dunes. The bus motored past Shipyard Plantation, Plantation Center, Shelter Cove Marina, large hotels, condos, and several golf courses. At the Shelter Cove Harbour stop, there were many small shops and several yachts that bordered the Broad Creek waterfront. But the main attraction was a large statue of Neptune. He was in sun dial mode, holding a harpoon directed skyward.

As we traveled northeast on the island, we passed Singleton Beach, Burk's Beach, and Folly Field Beach. Swimming was not on the agenda this morning. We made a quick pass through Port Royal Plaza in this section of the island. Adjacent to our location was

the Port Royal Plantation/Club House and three golf courses. No clubs, no play! One course gained the nickname, "Robber's Royal Golf Course" because of the high cost to play! Our next stop was at Fish Haul Beach which was near Mitchelville. Well, what was left of the town was a skeleton of small buildings. As was mentioned earlier, it was the first, free enclaved people's settlement. They named themselves, Gullah(Goo-lah) and spoke a prescribed language and dialect. More about them later.

Afterwards, the bus passed the HHI Airport, Palmetto Hall Golf Course, and North Ridge Plaza while traveling on Highway # 278 again. We learned that Ron Howard (current movie director and former, young actor on the Andy Griffith Show) had a home on the island. The lunch stop occurred at Shelter Cove Plaza. Since our appetites were on the upswing, the "Wayback Burgers" sign captured our attention. This establishment's service was well organized and well-staffed, so our orders were delivered promptly. An outside table for two was located and we lunched in an ideal, partly sunny location. Their advertisement read, "It's Time To Go Wayback." A few of our entourage joined the burger trail crowd when their choice of the adjacent, fast food restaurant was short of staff and slow of service. Our island guide informed us that there were 256 restaurants on HHI. No wonder a few places were short of helpers!

After a brief respite at the hotel, once again it was time to board the bus at 2:15. Again a toll was paid to cross the Broad Creek Bridge to the nearby Broad Creek Marina. The bus driver had to pay to cross it coming and going. However, this Cross Island Road tollway was the most direct and fastest route from the mainland to our hotel.

Our group was separated into two boats for a 2 hour, dolphin-watch cruise. We left the floating docks at 3:15. At this location an eleven foot tide can rise and fall. There was no dolphin disappointment today! Broad Creek had several of these marine mammals on display. It was difficult to photograph their activity because timing the camera with their brief, above surface exposure was a guessing game. I was only able to capture on a few dorsal fins with the cell phone camera. Applying for a photographer's job at National Geographic was out of the question!

Our boat operator informed us that dolphins are very intelligent. They know algebra and calculus! I made that up, but they are smart enough to avoid fishing hooks! There was an abundance of oyster shells on the banks during this low tide period. We learned that Blue Crabs live near the shore while Stone Crabs like deeper water. White, Pink, and Brown Shrimp were apparently present. My camera missed those too. Birds were prancing along the edge of the water trying to capture a meal. A black-necked Water Turkey was also spotted.

Dinner that evening was at the Port Royal Country Club on HHI. The meal was extraordinary and the conversation was lively at our table of eight. I spoke up and added my experience of enduring a 3-day, snow blizzard while serving in the US Air Force in North Dakota. That "chilled" everyone!
