REOPENED TUESDAY

On Friday afternoon, a field representative of Indiana Department of Revenue shut down Bil's Foods, 208 N. Jefferson St., Hartford City, and Country Corner, 7126 N. State Road 3, Hartford City. They have since taken care of the situation and reopened at noon Tuesday.

Shafer, who is acting on behalf of the new owner, pointed out that the community needs to know the truth about the matter. He indicated that there are rumors floating around Blackford County and the surrounding area that Bil's Foods and Country Corner were closed by Blackford County Health Department because of health code violations.

"People are saying we were closed due to violations," noted Shafer. "That is simply not the case."

Linda Briles, registered environmental health specialist with Blackford County Health Department, concurred with Shafer's statement. She told News Times on Sunday afternoon that the local health department did not shut down Bil's Foods and Country Corner.

"We have a good working relationship with both of those establishments," remarked Briles. 'They have not had any serious infractions."

According to Briles, in a situation where businesses have been closed and people are hearing that it is because of health code violations then it is important that the public know that the health department did not shut down the grocery store and restaurant.

Shafer shared that it is important to him that the community

knows the real reason because he believes when people falsely hear a business is closed due to health code violations then they start thinking all kinds of bad things about the establishment.

FALL BAZAAR



How can my church participate?



BREAST CANCER MONTH

Breast cancer is the most frequently diagnosed cancer among females in Indiana, excluding skin cancers, with approximately 4,400 cases in the state each year. October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month and State health officials are encouraging Hoosier women to get screened.

"Regular screenings are important to detecting breast cancer," said State Health Commissioner William VanNess, M.D. "Beginning at age 50, women should have a mammogram every year or two. Talk to your doctor to determine your risks and the benefit of screenings."

There are several risk factors that contribute to breast cancer.

Women have a much greater risk of developing breast cancer than do males, and that risk increases with age. Additional risk factors include:

· Genetics

People who have had two or more first degree relatives who have been diagnosed with breast cancer have an increased risk. Additionally, breast cancer risk increases if someone has a family member who carries the BRCA 1 or 2 genes, which account for 5-10 percent of breast cancer cases.

· Race

In Indiana, during 2007-2011, the breast cancer incidence rates for African American and white women were similar, but the mortality rate for African American women was 39 percent higher than for whites. This increased risk can partially be attributed to African American women being diagnosed with more aggressive forms of breast cancer or at later stages.

· Estrogen

Women who started menstruation before age 12 or menopause after age 55 might be at increased risk as a result of a higher lifetime exposure to estrogen.

· Pregnancy and Breastfeeding History

There are studies that show that women who have not had children, had their first child after age 30 or have not breastfed might have an increased risk of developing breast cancer. According to the American Cancer Society, some research indicates that for each year a mother breastfeeds her child, her relative risk for developing breast cancer is reduced by 4.3 percent.

Hormone Replacement Therapy (HRT)

Using HRT can increase a woman's risk of developing and dying from breast cancer. This risk can be increased after just two years of using HRT.

· Alcohol

Drinking alcohol has been linked to an increased risk of breast cancer and the risk increases with every drink consumed per day.

· Overweight and Obesity

Being overweight, especially post menopause, can increase your risk of developing breast cancer. The more body fat a woman has, the higher her estrogen levels typically are, increasing her risk of developing breast cancer.

The early stages of breast cancer typically show no symptoms. However, as the cancer progresses, some symptoms may be noticed. These can include:

· A lump or thickened breast tissue

- · Changes in breast size or shape
- · Changes in the texture of the skin of the breast or nipple, including dimpling or puckering
- · Nipple discharge, especially if the discharge is bloody

Contact your healthcare provider immediately if you have any of these symptoms.

HOMEMAKERS TRIP

The Huntington County Extension Homemakers coordinated a fall trip to historic Marshall, Michigan on Thursday, October 10, 2013. Twenty nine adults participated in the tour.

The day in Marshall began at the Michael W. Schragg Postal Museum. The museum, housed in the basement of the Marshall Post Office, offers two centuries of postal memorabilia including a 1890 post office store front, a 1931 Model A Mail Truck and assorted items related to postal delivery in the U.S. and several other countries. It is the largest collection outside of the Smithsonian and the only museum currently being operating and named for a living person. The tour of the museum was led my Mr. Schragg himself.

A guided driving tour of Marshall highlighted some architecturally unique homes, including a variety of Greek Revival, Colonial Revival, Romanesque and Italianate homes.

At noon, a buffet lunch was enjoyed at the historic Schuler's Restaurant, established in 1909. After lunch, a stop at the GAR Civil War Hall built in 1902 for the Grand Army of the Republic by Marshall Civil War Veterans highlighted artifacts from all American wars as well as the local firefighters.

The tourists visited the historic Capitol Hill School built in 1860, located near the Calhoun County Fairgrounds. They saw what a one room school house was like in 1860. The building served the community for over 100 years and houses a children's museum of toys, games, marionettes and a puppet stage.

The Honolulu House, built in 1860 as a private residence by Judge Abner Pratt upon his return from the Hawaiian Islands, was visited. The home featured detailed ornately painted ceilings and woodwork, trimmed in precious metals and decorative faux painting.

The day concluded at the Governor's Mansion, built in 1839 anticipating that Marshall would become the state Capital. The Greek revival dwelling never housed a governor, but the man who built it did serve as Michigan's third governor. There, apple pan dowdy and apple cider were enjoyed for dessert.

The group traveled via motor coach and were hosted by Sheryl Godby and S & S Travel of Kendallville, IN.
