"taking the Plunge" to raise vital funds for Special Olympics Indiana programs in northeast Indiana and across the state.

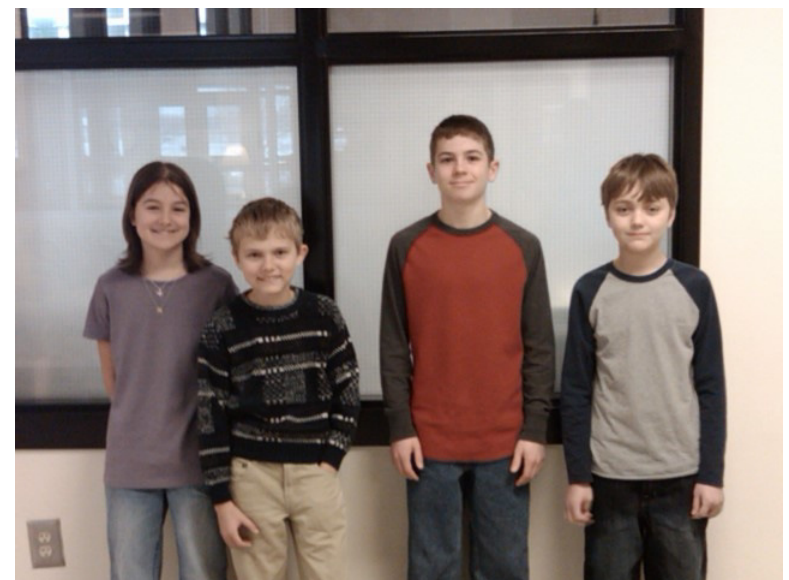

In 2009, Special Olympics Indiana is celebrating its 40th Anniversary and its 10th year with the Polar Plunge by holding 10 Plunge events across the state throughout the month February. Dozens of local residents are expected to turn out again this year for this wintry event at Mirror Lake on the campus of the University of St. Francis. 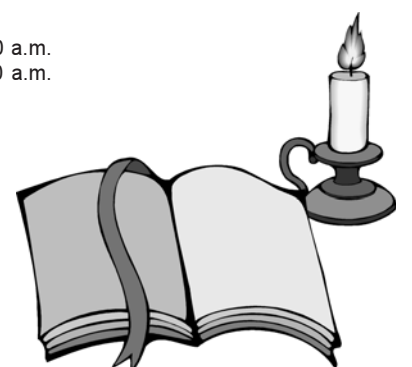

FARMER HELP

Purdue University is offering a workshop series to take a comprehensive look at managing margin risk and help producers navigate uncharted waters in 27 different locations across Indiana. The Managing Margin Risk program is being offered in Huntington County using interactive videoconferencing technology. Sessions are being held weekly on Tuesday evenings (7 p.m. to 9 p.m.) through February 24 at Huntington University, Science Hall – 2nd Floor Hiner Lecture Room (#225). The program is being sponsored locally by Halderman Farm Management and Real Estate Services, First Farmers Bank & Trust, Bippus State Bank, and Salamonie Mills.

Dates and topics for the four remaining sessions include:

* Feb. 3: What does the farm bill mean to you—will include an introduction to crop insurance, the new farm bill programs and how they influence each other.

* Feb. 10: Pricing alternatives at the local buyer—will cover market volatility and dynamics, the importance of basis and pricing alternatives at the elevator.

* Feb. 17: Crop insurance and marketing—will take a look at how the two work together.

* Feb. 24: Putting it all together in a plan to manage margin risk—will show farmers how their financial position affects their ability to take on margin risks and what strategies they should consider.

Speakers include Purdue Extension agricultural

economists - Allan Gray, Chris Hurt, George Patrick, Luc Valentin, and Corrine Alexander. Registration costs \$40 per person, which includes materials, handouts, and access to the course website. ANNIE'S PROJECT

A series of workshops aimed at helping Midwestern farm women become more involved business partners will convene throughout Indiana on Feb. 19.

Annie's Project, sponsored by the Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service's Women in Agriculture team, will be held in 18 Indiana counties every Thursday from Feb. 19 through March 26. Half of each session will be presented via IP video, and the other half will feature local speakers.

"Annie's Project is a very valuable set of workshops, especially in this time of financial stress in agriculture," said Purdue Extension educator, Kelly Easterday. "At a time when it's vitally important to manage farm operations by margins, Annie's Project will emphasize ways to make better financial decisions."

Each of the sessions on the 6-week course will combine lectures, discussions, individual and small group activities and computer training. The IP video portion will be led four of the six weeks by expert speakers from Purdue. Week five will be a presentation by Lynn Lambert of Strategic Financial Group, LLC, who will teach participants about computer software and record keeping for the farm business.

"We are bringing in these speakers because they are the best in their respective fields,"

Easterday said. "Each of them will bring something incredibly valuable for the participating women to take home to their farm businesses."

Purdue speakers and their topics include:

* Farm Family Finances, Elizabeth Kiss, Purdue Extension financial management specialist

* Farm Financial Analysis, Freddie Barnard, Purdue Extension agricultural economist

* Marketing Crops and Livestock, Corinne Alexander, Purdue Extension agricultural economist

* Farm Business Plans, Maria Marshall, Purdue Extension agricultural economist

In addition to the practical, hands-on experience, Annie's Project will help participants develop a support network with others in the same professions. Registration is \$75 per person before Feb. 5. After Feb. 5, the fee is \$85. Registration includes a course notebook and Fast Tools, a software program that allows participants to assess their current farm financial situations and create financial plans for the future.

SPONSORS NEEDED

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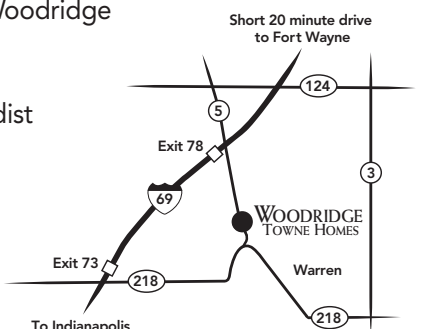

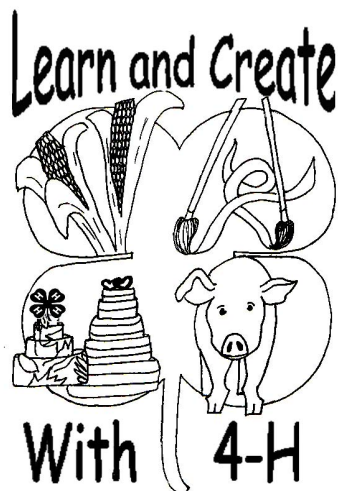

LIFEGUARD TESTS

Indiana State Parks and Reservoirs lifeguarding tests will be held at no cost to the participants for those wanting to work at State Park and Reservoirs properties, starting March 29. These tests are only for applicants who are already certified in Lifeguarding and CPR for the Professional Rescuer before attending this test.

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lot of thinking of how to downsize the garden and flower beds, it is getting to be a bit more than I can handle, so this keeps me thinking on the long winter days.

Next week will be Valentines Day and I have a cookbook that has all chocolate recipes in it. I will share one that might be nice for a special someone.

Triple-Tier Chocolate Pie
3 large egg whites, 1 pie shell, 1/2 teaspoon vinegar, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/3 cup sugar, 1 4 oz serving size instant chocolate pie filling, 2 cups chocolate milk. Allow egg whites to stand at room temp for 30 minutes. Bake pie shell according to directions. For the meringue, in large bowl beat egg whites, vinegar and cinnamon till forms soft peaks, gradually add sugar 1 tablespoon at a time beating on high speed about 4 minutes or until it forms stiff glossy peaks. Spread meringue over bottom of cooled pie crust and the sides. If you want to get fancy make swirls with a decorator bag around the

top edge of crust. Bake for 15 minutes at 325. For the filling prepare according to package directions except use the chocolate milk. Pour into the cooled pie shell cover with plastic wrap and chill about 2 hours. Top with White chocolate whipped cream. In a small sauce pan combine 1/4 cup whipping cream and 2 ounces white chocolate bark, heat over low heat to melt the bark. Cool completely and in a chilled mixing bowl beat 1/2 cup whipping cream at low speed till forms peaks add the cooled chocolate mix and continue beating till forms soft peaks. Dollop spoonfuls of mix on the pie and garnish with chocolate sprinkles. Or take a short cut and use cool whip and the sprinkles. Happy Valentines Day and also **Happy Birthday John.**
