LETTER TO THE EDITOR

As some of you know, I have left the position of Huntington County Veterans' Service Officer and am assuming the position Director of the Indiana Department of Veterans Affairs.

The knowledge, experience and friendships forged while in Huntington over the past ten years will stay with me forever and will better enable me to serve the veterans of Indiana.

During the past ten years as the Huntington County Veterans' Service Officer I've been able to reinforce a fact I've known for a long time: veterans are more than a statistic on a piece of paper. Each veteran has a face and each veteran has a story. A story he or she is proud of and would like to share with the people they love and respect. This is a fact I want to share with the Veterans' Service Officers who serve veterans in the other counties in Indiana. I want to show them how to tell those stories.

I would like to thank the citizens of Huntington County and the veterans and their families for all their support over the years. I would also like to thank the county commissioners and the members of the county council for their longtime support of my programs. The approval of the funds for the purchase of the Normandy Medals back in 1998 is just one example of their support. The commissioners and county council approved the expenditure of \$600 to purchase 40 of the medals so that veterans of the D-Day Invasion during World War II could at last be recognized for their brave service.

A few years ago, when I approached the mayor and the city council and asked if the city would like to help finance the annual Veteran's Day and Memorial Day programs, they voted unanimously to approve the requested funds, and they have supported every request since then.

Pastor Kevin Dunlop and his wife Jan, of the First Church of the Nazarene also deserve a heartfelt thank you. Beginning in the year 2000 the church generously donated the use of the sanctuary for both the Veteran's Day and Memorial Day programs. This was a beautiful place to hold these programs and, I'm sure, contributed to the good feelings felt by the honorees.

It should also be noted that the facilities of other organizations were also used over the years. In 1998 the Veteran's Day Program was held at the Huntington Armory. Over 500 people attended that first program and, after filling every chair, people willingly stood wherever they could find room. What a rewarding experience that

In 1999 the Memorial Day Program was held at the PAL Club and the Veteran's Day Program was held at the Merillat Center at Huntington College. I would like to thank the people who allowed to use their facilities for these programs. I want to thank the local newspapers, the Herald-Press, the

Huntington County TAB, the Warren Weekly and the Roanoke News, which, without fail published my news releases and helped me keep the veterans of Huntington County and their spouses and dependents aware of changing VA benefits.

I want to thank the officers and members of American Legion Post 7, American Legion Post 85, American Legion Post 160, VFW Post 2689 and VFW Post 6671 for their loyal support for the past 10

Thank you to my secretary/assistant, Linda Jennings, for her knowledge, dedication and friendship. She taught me everything I know about veterans' benefits. I know that the office will continue to run well during the interim period between service officers, and that the next service officer will also benefit from her training.







We think that situation is all taken care of now and I'm on preventative medicine to ward off the problem.

The cards, letters, food, flowers and concern have all been greatly appreciated. You really don't realize how much and how many people care until something like this happens. I have learned one big thing through this, so far, there is always someone worse off than you are. I can sit here feeling sorry for myself and then I'll hear of someone who has stage 4 lung cancer, or who has lost a child in a wreck and realize that I'm pretty lucky. Yes, life isn't the greatest right now, but I still have it, my family and a good prognosis. This is just a major bump in the road - but we will get over it eventually.

They say there is a reason for everything and maybe the reason for this was to humble me, teach me patience, let me learn who I am and what my purpose is. Hopefully, I will become a better person on the other side of this.

Again, thank you for your love, concern, prayers and thoughts through this difficult time. It's humbling to know that so many people care.




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
