LABOR DAY! WHAT AND WHY IS IT?

by V Neil Wyrick People were writing about labor long before there was a Labor Day. Sophocles wrote "Without labor nothing prospers." With a chuckle Anatole France penned "Man is so made that he can only find realization from one kind of labor by taking up another." "Sometimes it's important to work for that pot of gold...but sometimes the most important decision in the day simply consists of choosing which color to slide down on the rainbow." (Douglas

Labor Day itself is a celebration of two things; a day off to not labor but do as you please and secondly to officially begin to say goodbye to summer. Its purpose can be found on history books as a day to be pay tribute to working day men and women. It can be found on countless jokers pages with comments such as "What do I do on Labor Day? As little as possible."

Depending on who you talk to, the whole idea was thought up by either by Peter McGuire, general secretary of the Brotherhood of Carpenters or by Matthew Maguire, later the secretary of Local 344 of the International Association of Machinists in Paterson, N.J. Having halved the credit between these two it is sufficient to say that no one argued with the idea.

It was relaxing. It was fun. It made its point. The first Labor Day parade took place in 1882 in New York City. The first Monday for its celebration was accepted as official because it was at a half way point between Independence Day and Thanksgiving. The power of Labor has raised up and shrunk again during all the years since. Union membership today is down to its lowest level; 14 %. But Labor Day itself. It is permanent.

Permanent and different from any of the other holidays. It does not celebrate a war or a public figure but rather the common man. Even the most ignorant of men know that the world cannot continue if labor is not at the heart of daily existence. It is the glue that holds civilization together while rest is the common sense that seeks some time of equal respite.

When it comes to working, a large part of the population now spend their time sitting rather than in front of a machine or a plow. My grandfather was a farmer and sitting was a leisure luxury rather than a place of employment. He measured how hard he had been working by how much hay was harvested. Today we look toward a computer go give us a production percentage.

There has always been a battle between labor and management as to what is right and equitable. The fellow at the top of the ladder and worker bee at the bottom. Where balance could be found, it was sought.

Almost everyone agrees that without an honest days labor one can easily become a victim of boredom and want and both sides well know this. So, yes, when the word retirement comes up so comes up the question, "Retire to what." Someone has said the hardest thing about retirement is that you never get a day off.

KUDOS, KICKS & KARATS



Fall is fast approaching us with shorter daylight hours. Have you noticed the leaves are beginning to loose their vibrant green colors and you can hear the leaves rustling

in the breezes and some are very dry falling fast.

I have lots of chores I would like to get done in next few weeks. Some of the hardy flowers need to be move or dig out completely. The soil is so dry and hard it is useless to even try for a while. These fall like days the squirrels and birds have been busy at the feeders getting fat for the winter. The squirrels should be good and healthy they have cleaned the English walnut tree completely. Next year I need to figure a way to keep them out of it.

My dad loved the squirrels enjoyed watching them play in the trees during the winter months. He was very protective of them. One year when I was home I missed him and found him out at the walnut tree raking up the nuts and pilling them in the old outhouse where they stored their winter stash and they were out there with him working just as hard putting away their winter food. He also made certain the birds were fed no matter if they were sparrows or winter song birds. He seems to have plenty of both and I enjoyed watching them just as much as he did.

Later I will give a recipe for suet cake I use for the birds in the winter. I usually use a chicken scratch that you can buy at our local elevator and it also makes a good economical feed. I often mix it with sunflower seed.

Just something to think about with fall soon going to be upon us. I recently bought at the farmers market some butternut squash and we had some fried in butter. I slice it thin about 1/4 inch thick peel it and fry it in butter. It is quite tasty. The larger end I peel cut it up in cubes and mix about 1/3 cup brown sugar 1 tablespoon flour and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon together and add it to about 3 cups cut up squash and mix lightly and put in a seal a meal bag add 1 pat of butter seal and freeze. I just remove from the freezer and cook in microwave a few minutes depending on your oven wattage. Makes for a tasty addition and quick fix for a meal.

Enjoy the fall season approaching us.
