THE UPTOWN GARDENER

Happy springtime to everyone, even though we are having some chilly days. Hang in there it will get better with each

This past weekend our family celebrated an early Easter with a trip to Shipshewana for the day. We started out the day eating breakfast in Auburn at a very nice restaurant with

Gayle and family. She joined us to travel on to Shipshewana for a day of shopping and dinner at the Blue Gate Restaurant with a nice family style dinner. Of course we then needed to walk off all the good food we had consumed. In all we had a very nice time (and no one had to cook). We all came home a bit tired and was fortunate not to encounter any rain or bad weather until we were almost home. A great day was had by all

I had a question asked about Knockout roses. I too will be planting some this year. Therefore I did a little research on them. They are a very dependable plant, very hardy for our planting zone. Also require very little maintenance. Plant them in a sunny location in good soil, they should not require pruning only about every 3-4 years. At that time removing about 1/3 of the bush to allow for new growth and good air circulation around the plants.

Plant each bush about 4 feet apart, they usually have a flush of blooms about every 4 weeks. It would be good to give each bush rose fertilizer according to manufacturers directions. Doing this after each flush of bloom they should provide you with blooms from spring till frost. This rose variety does well in a mixed garden or as a focal point or as rose hedge. Most varieties are about 3-4 wide and can be up to 3-5 feet in height depending on the variety.

In my greenhouse the plants are coming along nice and anxious to move them outside. I have peas, lettuce and spinach planted close to the garage where the warmth from the cement foundation helps to release heat in the overnite hours. Soon I hope to be having my favorite peanut butter and lettuce sandwiches for lunch.

The rhubarb is coming up and anxious to make some nice fresh rhubarb desserts.

I found this recipe and I will be trying it as it sounded a bit different but good.

Rhubarb Sherbert

4 cups rhubarb diced, 1/4 cup water, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup corn syrup, 1/2 cup orange juice, 1 tsp lemon rind grated or a tablespoon lemon juice, 2 egg whites, 2 tablespoon sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Cook rhubarb in the water till done add the 1 cup sugar stir till dissolved. Remove from heat and add the corn syrup, orange juice and lemon. Chill few hours. Beat the egg whites, 2 tablespoon sugar and salt till foamy. Slowly add the rhubarb to the egg whites mixing together well. Either pour into ice cream freezer and process according to the freezer directions for ice cream or pour into a 9x13 pan and freeze, removing and thoroughly mixing it with an electric mixer and refreeze, repeat this again one more time.

When serving, top each serving with fresh sliced strawberries with a bit of sugar added to them according to your taste.

Enjoy and have a great spring, isn't it great to see the beautiful daffodils blooming!





COUNCIL NOTES

The Warren Town Council met at 4 p.m Monday, March 23 in Assembly Hall. President Bill Cartwright conducted the meeting which opened with all in attendance repeating the Pledge to the American Flag.

EXPRESSION THROUGH ART

In partnership with the Alzheimer's Association, Heritage Pointe will host a Memories in the Making® Art Exhibit on Saturday, April 4th in Applegate Cove from 2-4 p.m.

Memories in the Making® is an art program for individuals in the early and middle stages of Alzheimer's disease or related disorders, which offers the opportunity for creativity and expression through the visual arts

Groups of 6-8 individuals met weekly to paint. Each group met under the guidance of an art facilitator specifically trained, by the Alzheimer's Association, to work with individuals with Alzheimer's disease and other related dementia.

The individuals participating in the art exhibit express themselves through the creative process of painting in place of verbal communication which may ormay not be present, depending on the severity of their dementia. It's the time of year when thousands of animals are born in the wild. With the spread of suburban areas into animals' natural habitats, many people find baby wild animals that appear to be alone. Thinking the animals are orphaned, hurt, abandoned or lost, well-meaning individuals sometimes "rescue" them.

Doing so is not only usually unnecessary, it's bad for the animal. It's illegal if you don't have the proper permit. And it poses health risks for humans. With more and more suburban areas being built close to natural areas, young animals are increasingly born near humans and discovered without an adult animal nearby, so a few reminders are especially pertinent.

"The apparent lack of an adult does not mean a young animal is alone," said Linnea Petercheff, operations staff specialist for the DNR's Fish and Wildlife division. "Adults often leave their young alone, safe in nests or dens while they forage for food, but rarely do they abandon their young."

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LIFELINE & LINK UP ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

In order to increase the availability of telecommunications services to all consumers in our serving area, Citizens Telephone offers two low income assistance programs, Lifeline Assistance and Link Up Assistance. An eligible customer receives a \$6.50 credit toward their Federal Subscriber Line charge, as well as a \$1.75 credit towards the residential local access line rate.

Link Up Assistance provides a credit for up to one half (1/2) of the new service connection charges for telecommunications service. This credit is only available on the installation of a single residential access line at the principal residence of the eligible customer.

She was born near Butler. Pennsylvania and she was the daughter of Forrest H. and Mary Lena (Giles) Burtner.



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

If a bird has fallen out of a nest, it is OK to gently return it to the nest. The best way to make sure an animal is truly orphaned is to wait and check it periodically. If you are unsure, place some strings or sticks across the nest. If such items are later disturbed, the mother has returned. In such a situation, leave the young animal alone. The adult will return after you leave the area.

Personal safety is another consideration. While such animals may look helpless, cute and cuddly, they can bite or scratch people who attempt to handle them. Some wild animals can carry parasites and infectious diseases, some of which can be transmitted to humans.

Remember, state laws prohibit owning protected wild animals without a permit. Federal laws also prohibit the possession of migratory birds, including songbirds, raptors and waterfowl. It is even illegal to treat wild animals for sickness or injury without a permit. Wild animal rehabilitation permits are issued to qualified individuals who take in sick, injured, or orphaned wild animals with the intent of releasing them back into the wild. If you encounter an injured, truly abandoned or sick wild animal, do one of the following for assistance:

HEAR ABOUT QUILTS

The Montpelier Historical Society met at the Community Building on March 24, 2009. After a short business meeting those present were treated to an interesting program on quilts by Mary Kelsay. She displayed various quilts, quilt tops and quilt squares, some of which were from the Civil War era, along with newer quilts dating in the 1930's and 1940's.

Quilting started in China and was later copied by European countries before coming to the United States. Years ago a lady named Marie Webster of nearby Marion, Indiana, designed and sold many sought-after quilt patterns which turned into a successful mail order business for her. Her former home has since been restored to become headquarters of the Quilters Hall of Fame.

Examples of quilt construction are: a whole cloth quilt, patchwork quilt or appliqué. Many early quilts show exquisite handiwork exhibiting tiny, almost perfect stitches. Much present day quilting is done on sewing machines.

The storage of quilts is important. Perhaps the best method is to lay the guilt flat on a bed and out of sunlight. A large carpet tube may be used to roll a quilt onto for storage but the tube should first

be covered with acid-free paper or a white, cotton bed sheet. Another storage hint is to fold the quilt loosely in thirds and wrap it in a white, cotton pillow case. Also, acid-free boxes are excellent for quilt storage.


Mary stressed some rules for quilt owners: Never store a quilt in plastic. If storing in a drawer or trunk, first paint the inside with polyurethane. Never have a quilt dry cleaned. Air the quilt periodically. Avoid washing a quilt if possible.

Care and preservation of any historic item is important and proper guidelines should be followed. What is preserved today becomes a treasure of tomorrow. The next meeting of Montpelier Historical Society will be at the Community Building on April 28, 2009 at 6:30 P.M.

The nationwide switch to digital television broadcasting will be complete on June 12, 2009, but your local television stations may switch sooner. After the switch, analogonly television sets that receive TV programming through an antenna will need a converter box to continue to receive overthe-air TV. Watch your local stations to find out when they will turn off their analog signal and switch to digital-only broadcasting. Analog-only TVs should

continue to work as before to receive low power, Class A or translator television stations and with cable and satellite TV services, gaming consoles, VCRs, DVD players, and similar products.

If you currently subscribe to Warren Cable's programming, this transition will not affect your signal. However, if you pull your programming from an antenna and currently have an analog TV set, you may need additional equipment (i.e. converter box) or replace your set with a digital ready TV.
