The New Reformation Band will be performing Thursday, June 23 at 2 p.m. in the Applegate Chapel of the United Methodist Memorial Home. This is another program in the Fine Arts Series. The program is free to the public.

In its 35 years, the New Reformation Band has given thousands of performances worldwide, playing traditional jazz, considered by many to be America's only original art form.

From its first performance at a Saginaw church, the band has played its "joyful sound" at national jazz festivals, with various US symphony orchestras, on cruise ships, in concert halls, at schools and colleges, as well as performing hundreds of worship services in churches of many faiths.

The band was founded on February 8, 1970 by the Oppermann Brothers and Reverend Gary Miller for a single performance at Saginaw's First Congregational Church. Today it is recognized as one of the country's pre-eminent classic jazz groups which has appeared from coast to coast, in Europe, the Caribbean, and South America.

The universal popularity enjoyed by the NRB emanates from its versatile and talented gang of seven musicians, all of whom contribute instrumentally, vocally, and humorously. There are no wallflower introverts allowed in this eclectic mix of musical masterminds, and audiences delight in the spontaneous combustion of repartee and music produced by these guys.

Featuring the founding Oppermann Brothers and five "superstar" sidemen, these seven friendly fellows...whose enthusiasm and wit is ever present...provide an entertainment experience most memorable.

1½ cup sifted cake flour ¾ cup sugar 1½ tsp baking powder ½ tsp salt 1/3 cup hot water 3 eggs

½ tsp lemon extract

Grease or spray 8" pan. Beat eggs, until frothy, add sugar gradually, then hot water and lemon extract. Quickly add flour, baking powder and salt. Pour into 8" pan and bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 20-25 minutes.



Visitation was held at United Methodist Memorial Home, Warren, and continuing at Center Chapel United Methodist Church.



#### **G**ET **T**ESTED

INDIANAPOLIS —Health officials estimate that 25 percent of persons infected with HIV don't know it. The Indiana State Department of Health is promoting HIV awareness throughout June and July with the "Get Tested for HIV" campaign.

"Get Tested for HIV" is an educational campaign on HIV that encourages those at risk for infection to get tested for the virus, to receive counseling, and to seek appropriate care or prevention services.

According to the March 2005 Quarterly HIV/STD report by the State Department of Health, there are currently 7,184 people in Indiana identified as being infected with HIV.

"Knowledge is one of our best weapons against the spread of HIV," said Michael Butler, director of the State Department of Health's HIV/STD Division. "That is why it is so important to get people at risk for infection with HIV tested and to provide them counseling and referrals to necessary services."

The Office of Minority Health at the State Department of Health has awarded 46 minigrants to local organizations and churches to support their efforts to provide HIV testing and counseling services to Hoosiers. Each grantee received up to \$2,000. Funding was made available through the State and Territorial Minority HIV/AIDS Demonstration Program.

"One of the goals of the HIV/ AIDS Demonstration Program is to help build the capacity of these organizations to plan local events as part of the 'Get Tested for HIV' campaign," said Danielle Patterson, director of the Office of Minority Health.

# Welcomes the Art of Garfield

Wabash, IN — An exhibition of artworks featuring the world's most famous cat is on display in the Clark Gallery at the Honeywell Center. The Art of Garfield exhibit, featuring 86 original paintings, will be presented June 3 through July 5. An opening reception will be held at the gallery on Friday, June 3 from 4:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. and is open to the public.

The Clark Gallery is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., seven days a week. Original acrylic on canvas paintings and other Garfield merchandise are available for purchase through the Honeywell Center Box Office from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Mon. through Fri., and Sat. from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. A portion of the proceeds benefits the Honeywell Center.

Born near Fairmount, Indiana, Jim Davis, the mastermind behind Garfield, still works and lives in East Central Indiana. Davis took an interest in cartooning at an early age and went on to study art at Ball State University. After college, Davis worked for T.K. Ryan, the car-

toonist who created Tumbleweeds. After several failed attempts at getting his own strip, Gnorm Gnat, a strip about a bug, syndicated, Davis took a long hard look at the comics pages to see what was working. There were several strips about dogs, but none about cats. Combining his wit with his art skills and his knowledge of cats from his childhood on a farm, Davis created Garfield, a cynical, lazy, lasagna-loving fat cat.

The comic strip debuted in 1978 in just 41 U.S. newspapers but quickly grew into the fastest growing and most widely syndicated comic strip in the world, and now appears in 2600 newspapers worldwide. Aside from the comic strip, Garfield's popularity spawned an entire cottage industry of Garfield merchandise, books, and TV shows. A company Davis founded to support the fat cat's business concerns, Paws, Inc., is located near Albany, Indiana. In 2004, Twentieth Century Fox brought the furry feline to the silver screen in his first full-length feature film, Garfield-The Movie.



#### School Safety: **W**HAT PARENTS CAN DO TO HELP

(NUI) - While your child's school may have been spared from any headline-catching, violent incidents, chances are that less dramatic acts of hostility, such as bullying and harassment, occur there every day.

Most schools have programs to prevent violence and help keep students safe. But safety precautions shouldn't stop there. As a parent, you also can take specific actions to improve school safety.

To raise awareness of school safety and security issues, the National Crime Prevention Council, best known for its 25-year-old beloved icon, McGruff the Crime Dog, developed the Be Safe and Sound initiative in collaboration with National PTA. This effort, funded by the Allstate Foundation, Assa Abloy Group and the Security Industry Association, provides advice that parents, community members and educators can use to help make school a pleasant environment for all children.

The National Crime Prevention Council provides the following tips for parents.

- \* Listen and talk to your child regularly. Communicating with your child on a number of topics related to school, friends and his or her interests can give you valuable insight. Talk to your child about violence and how to solve problems.
- \* Set an example. Show your child that you can settle conflicts peacefully and nonviolently. Also, show your support for school policies and rules. If your child feels a rule is wrong, explain how the rule can increase school safety.
- \* Work with others. Join a parent, school or neighborhood association to discuss problems with violence in the community. Work together to find solutions and ways you can provide support to the schools in your community.

The National Crime Prevention Council provides tools for parents as part of its Be Safe and Sound initiative. The "Caregivers' Guide to Safety and Security," for example, outlines what parents can do to improve school safety and security. It contains an overview of school safety and security guidelines, an assessment checklist and advice and tips on advocating for change at their children's schools. Another resource, the "School Safety and Security Toolkit: A Guide for Parents, Schools, and Communities," assists parents and community members in working with school administrators and policymakers to help make schools as safe as possible.
