NIELSEN TALKS CORN

Bob Nielsen is known in many agricultural crowds in the state as "the corn guy". He even has a license plate on his vehicle with this designation on it. Nielsen is an Extension

specialist in the Department of Agronomy at Purdue. He recently gave a talk at an Extension workshop for farmers in Huntington County.

Nielsen discussed many essential corn growing decisions during his presentation. However, the decision of hybrid selection was at the top of the list. One chart in his presentation showed the range in hybrid yields in 2009 Purdue variety trials in locations across the state. He relates the difference in yields from the highest performing hybrid to the lowest performing hybrid at each location. His finding is a spread equal to \$175 to \$322 per acre in gross income between the highest and lowest hybrid at a \$3.50 per bushel corn price.

Nielsen stresses that there is no such thing as a perfect hybrid. He notes that consistency of yield over years and across locations is based primarily on the abilities of corn hybrids to tolerate unforeseen stresses. He recommends identifying hybrids that are within 10% of the highest hybrid yield in every variety trial they are entered.

One method of identifying consistency that Nielsen mentioned is calculating relative hybrid yield performance across multiple trials. This means that your hybrid yield is divided by the highest yield in the trial. For example, if your hybrid yielded 200 bushels per acre and the top hybrid was 220 bushels per acre, then your hybrid yielded 91% relative to the maximum hybrid.

Beginning with the 2009 Purdue University trial data, the relative hybrid yield is being used as an alternative way to

evaluate consistency among locations. The information can be found at the following Web site: <http://www.ag.purdue.edu/agry/PCPP>.

Note that this site allows growers to compare corn hybrids or soybean varieties grown all across Indiana.

"Our goal is to provide quality, independent data for producers and companies," said Phil DeVillez, director of the Purdue Crop Performance Program (PCPP). "These test results provide farmers with a tool they can use in making their hybrid or variety selections."

The PCPP Web site is only one resource for collecting hybrid information. As any farmer will tell you, seed company sales representatives can provide valuable literature and trial data to assist in making decisions.

Nielsen summarizes wise hybrid selection by recognizing these key factors:

- * Requires a lot of research & homework.

- * Can be challenging because multiple location data are often difficult to obtain.

- * Can be challenging because yield data often require further analysis & scrutiny.

- * Can dramatically improve net income due to higher and more consistent yields for growers.

100 YEARS IN 100 DAYS

The Indiana High School Athletic Association (IHSAA) is calling on players and coaches from all former state championship boys basketball teams to participate in a once-in-a-lifetime 100th Anniversary Celebration Parade. On Saturday, March 27, at 3 p.m., the stars of Hoosier Hysteria will step off in downtown Indianapolis to culminate the "100 Years IN 100 Days" Celebration, a state-wide campaign commemorating the 100th anniversary of the boys basketball state tournament, a milestone moment in history.

For the first time, fans will have the chance to see basketball

legends from a century of championships as they ride by on floats, fire trucks and vintage cars through the streets of Indianapolis.

Bands, cheerleading squads and mascots from winning schools will de-light thousands of spectators as they march alongside representatives from over seventy championship teams, including the "Big-O" Oscar Robertson.

The 100th Anniversary Celebration Parade will begin at Pennsylvania and Vermont and travel down Pennsylvania past the Birch Bayh Federal Building and US Courthouse, where it will turn right onto Ohio. After
