This week's recipe is not exactly traditional, but it is easy because you can buy so many of the ingredients without leaving the town of Warren!

The Smoky Joe Burger is one of Natalie Jeanne's featured hamburgers. This is what you need to put together this wonderful summer backyard barbeque.

Hamburger patties, preferably Black Angus BBQ Sauce, preferably Michael's Homemade Sauce, Smoked Cheddar Cheese, Bacon, Hamburger Buns, Corn on the Cob, Fresh Tomatoes, and Homemade pie.

Now the best part about this is that almost everything you need for this meal is for sale at the Warren Farmer's Market. Who would have thought??

In the town of Warren, we are so fortunate to have so many fresh ingredients from our local farmers. One farm in particular, and one of the regulars at the Warren Farmer's Market every Saturday, is Raab's Ray of Hope

Farm which raises Black Angus Cattle mainly for breeding but also for consumption.

David and Judy Raab have owned their farm since 1982 and incorporated the cows in 1996. They average about 75 cows, give or take the calves. They don't use any growth hormones and only use antibiotics if needed. The Raab's sell their Black Angus beef at the Warren Farmer's Market. A pound of bulk beef costs \$2.25 and the patties cost \$2.50.

Grill up the burgers and slather some of Michael's BBQ sauce on top. Sorry folks, Michael won't reveal the recipe, but you can buy his sauce at the Market! Add some smoked cheddar and bacon and you've got yourself a Smoky Joe Burger.

Thanks to Rod, owner of Warren Variety and Discount Store, for supplying us with Fresh Indiana Sweet corn. Fresh, organic tomatoes are ripening as we speak and should be ready in a couple of weeks. For dessert, stop by R Bakery's tent at the Market and pick up a delicious home made pie!

Now if you haven't been to the Warren Farmer's Market yet, this should encourage you to go! It's held every Saturday from 8am-12pm at the Eckman Motor's Parking Lot. Look forward to seeing you there....Until next week, Bon Appetit!

## COMMUNITY FIRST AID

The Huntington County Chapter of the American Red Cross is offering a Community First Aid and Safety course at the Courthouse Annex (354 N. Jefferson St., 2nd floor meeting room 204), on Saturday, July 30th from 9am to 5pm. Enter the building through doors off parking lot for classes.

Participants will learn first aid procedures, how to check a victim for consciousness, how to perform rescue breathing, conscious and unconscious obstructed airway procedures, and

cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) on an adult, child and infant.

The Red Cross provides visual, auditory, and manual learning tools to increase your learning process. The training is standardized and recognized by many national, state and local authorities.

Payment of \$45 per student is due at the time of registration (\$30 if only need the CPR, \$30 if only need First Aid). The Better Business Bureau has received complaints about a company called Blacktop Services.

The consumer claims that the company came to their door and said they had a "little blacktop left over" and wanted to get rid of it, so the consumer let them re-pave some of the drive. This cost them \$1,150. These perpetrators came back again, gave them the same story, and BEGGED the consumers to let them use what blacktop they had. Before the consumers knew what was happening, Blacktop Services was doing the entire drive. This round cost them \$7,300! The consumer reports now that weeds are growing through it, holes are appearing, and it was chipping off at the edge.

### THOUSANDS VISIT WARREN FOR SSF EVENTS

What a remarkable Salamonie Summer Festival we just experienced! The 2005 Festival has to go down in the books as one of the best ever. With record crowds and even more events this year, anyone who lives in this great little community should be proud. Warren's annual Fourth of July festival is truly a small town festival. From the major crowd drawing events to the small ones, forty-one total events, your local hometown people were running all of those events! Even the food vendors during this celebration are mostly local and non-profit organizations.

In case you have not had the opportunity to be a part of the planning of such a festival, it would not be possible without the generosity of your local businesses. ## COUNCIL NOTES

The Warren Town Council met on Monday evening, July 11 in Assembly Hall.

During a special meeting held prior to the regular meeting, Julia Glessner was sworn in as a council member to fill the unexpired term left due to the resignation of Harold Jones.

Council was re-organized with David Scheib named president and Bill Cartwright vice-president.

President Scheib opened the regular meeting at 6:30 p.m. with all in attendance repeating the Pledge to the American Flag.

Minutes of a special meeting and a regular meeting on June 13 were approved as submit-

ted.

A citizen in attendance commented on the many improvements made throughout the town. There was one problem on College Street still not taken care of.

Dr Kevin DeaKyne spoke to Council concerning a billboard on I69 drawing attention to the Town of Warren. A sign with a three-year contract would cost \$11,600. Some organizations have indicated they would help with the cost. Council said they would take the matter under advisement.

A paving contract was awarded to E&B Paving in the amount of \$61,887.

A report was given on a short Park Board meeting held prior to the Council meeting. The Board asked about the possibility of having the rest rooms open during the day, but due to a considerable amount of vandalism at the Park restrooms, Council denied the request.

Bids for upgrade of well number two were: Ortman Drilling and Water Service, \$16,431 and Peerless Midwest, \$13,634. Council agreed to take the bids under advisement and award at the next meeting.

A Public Hearing was set for July 25 for a street vacation.

A report on the 2005 Salamonie Summer Festival was given. The Utility Department, Police Department and Festival Committee were commended for the work on this year's festival.

An I&M Emergency Service contract and the I&M Service contract were discussed and taken under advisement for fur-

ther study.

An OSHA pre-inspection was conducted by Downy Insurance. Five items were cited but have been corrected.

Ordinance 2005-19 was introduced, pertaining to two hour parking on the North side of First Street, East of Wayne Street, and 15 minute parking on the South Side of First Street in front of the Post Office. There will be a Public Hearing July 25.

Council agreed to pay \$63.60 to IACT for a study of funding avenues for cities and towns.

Resolution 2-2005 allows transfer in Lieu of Taxes from the Electric Utility to the General Fund.

Warren will host W.H.A.R.M.M. meeting with a cookout. Approximately forty county, City and town officials from Huntington County are expected.

Clerk-Treasurer Marilyn Morrison gave the May financial report.

Curtis Day reported from the

Utility/Street departments. Activities included replacing of meters and replacement of eight poles. New bleachers had been installed at the Park.

There had been a problem with high voltage throughout the town. AEP has been working to correct the problem as it originated at the substation on State Road 218.

Huntington County landfill has agreed to take sludge this year which will reduce the cost of hauling to Jay County landfill.

During Salamonie Summer Festival nine trash cans were stolen as well as traffic cones. Curt Day informed Council that several traffic signs have been stolen or defaced also.

Day asked permission for meter readers to read meters early in the morning on very hot days. Permission was granted as long as work hours are covered.

Drivers can park in the lot adjoining the swimming pool. Park staff encourage visitors to bring lawn chairs, insect repellent and refreshments, but to remember the park's "carry in, carry out" policy for trash.

The program is offered free of charge, except for the regular gate fee of \$4 per vehicle (\$5 per out-of-state vehicle).
