

NEW SNOW SKATING SAID EASIER, MORE FUN THAN SNOWBOARDING

So you want to have fun in the snow, but you don't have a lot of time to travel far or a lot of money to pay for a resort. Here's how to spend an enjoyable Saturday afternoon, get fresh air and exercise, and be home in time for dinner.

Try snow skating.

With this new sport, various configurations of equipment are all called snow skates. Some snow skating is really a winter variation on inline skating. Skaters wear special boots with small, metal edged skis attached to the bottom.

Another configuration is more like a skateboard. It is slightly wider and longer than a skateboard, made of plastic, and has a channeled base for stability and tracking. A foam top sheet provides traction. No special boots or bindings are required. One young skater says falling off is the best part of it. It doesn't hurt because there are no bindings. You just jump off. (You can barely turn on it, you just try to keep your balance and go to the bottom of the hill.)

Young snow skaters say that the equipment and sport can be learned fast. Once you get the hang of it, you can snow skate anywhere. You can go a skateboard park, or just a snowy country hillside.

The original snow skates were developed by snowboarder Andy Wolf in 1999. He had sold 200,000 by last year.

Another variation that is loosely referred to as snow skates include the snow deck. It has a larger board, mounting, and a separate ski on trucks below the deck. The deck moves side to side at an angle slight enough for stability sufficient enough to aid turns.

Many owners prefer the snow skate to the snow deck because it is closer to their real passion, skateboarding,

NIPSCO OFFERS FINANCIAL AID

NIPSCO announced the aid program last Tuesday. The money set aside for local assistance is part of \$656,000 being made available to NIPSCO customers in northern Indiana.

The money is not a donation by NIPSCO, The funds are coming from a \$3.8 million refund the utility must pay for overcharging customers in March, the Indiana Office of the Utility Consumer Counselor reported.

The Huntington Corp Salvation Army will administer funds to those NIPSCO customers who qualify for heating assistance.

Beginning Monday, January 26, 2004, The Salvation Army will be taking appointments for those in need of financial assistance towards their NIPSCO bill. People applying for part of the \$8,440.00 in extra heating assistance through NIPSCO can contact The Salvation Army, 356-3485, Monday-Friday 9:00 am - 4:00 pm.

The heating assistance money, NIPSCO Heat Aid 2004, will help two groups of people:

* Those which annual income is 125% or less of the federal poverty guidelines and who also qualify for state energy assistance. They are eligible for a maximum of \$300 towards their deposit if their NIPSCO gas service is currently disconnected.

* People with an annual income of 126% to 250% of federal poverty guidelines who don't qualify for state energy aid. They are eligible for a maximum of \$300 toward their outstanding NIPSCO bill. Applicants must have received a delinquent bill notice since Nov. 1, 2003, or must be attempting to restore service after disconnection. The approximate annual household income range would be less than \$22,450 for one person and less than \$46,000 for a family of four.

In each case, the customer must pay a \$100 matching contribution to receive NIPSCO aid. Many needy people do not have the \$100 matching payment required before they can receive up to \$300 toward either a natural gas service deposit or an outstanding bill. 
