5 TIPS FOR THE FUTURE COLLEGE STUDENT

- 4. Study your financial aid offers | Every little detail matters. A university offering you a \$1,000 scholarship for tuition that's \$5,000 a year is much more affordable than one offering you a \$15,000 scholarship when its tuition is \$35,000 a year. The bottom line matters. If it's confusing, ask for clarification.
- 5. It's possible to balance work and still attend classes | More than 80% of our students work at least part time and make progress toward a degree. I worked as many as three part-time jobs and had a full-time class schedule in college. It teaches you critical prioritization and time management skills. It does not have to be one or the other.

And for those recent high school graduates who have yet to make a decision on their college plans, Surface says many universities like Purdue Fort Wayne are well prepared to work with students who are still interested in starting their coursework as early as the upcoming fall semester. That assistance often includes answering questions about enrollment, financial aid, registering for classes, student housing, and various other topics.

A FOOTBALL & SIGHTSEEING TRIP TO LOS ANGELES DAY 2, PART 2

After leaving the Warner Brothers Studio at 11:45 am, we headed to the Los Feliz section of Los Angeles. My granddaughter had planned for us to lunch at the All Time Restaurant on Hillhurst Avenue. Parking was limited so it became a two and half blocks hike to that eatery. The turkey sandwich that I ordered was huge. I traded half of it to my son in exchange for one of his three, small, fish tacos.

Upon leaving the restaurant, we headed to the nearby Griffith Park and its famous observatory. The structure was opened in 1935 and is 1,134 feet above sea level. It sits on the south slope of Mount and Hollywood overlooks the LA basin as well as the illustrious Hollywood sign! The mountainous area was donated by Griffith J. Griffith in 1896. The heavily traveled road had several switch-back curves. The short walk up to the observatory was closed to cars and no other nearby parking was available. So, we missed out of that view.

The Nissan exited onto Feliz Boulevard and lining the street were extra-large trees. Their whitish-colored, smooth trunks had multi branches that formed near the base of the tree. After passing the zoo, we turned onto Finlay Street where the extremely tall palm trees reminded me of pictures of Beverly Hills. driving While toward Hollywood, we drove past the Immaculate Heart High School where Meghan Markle attended. After

turning onto Hollywood Boulevard, the car crossed the intersection of Hollywood and Vine!

The Chinese Theater and Wax Museum were observed before parking to check out the Walk of Fame. We were obvious tourists while slowly moving along both sides of two blocks and taking pictures of several goldplated names embedded in star-shaped, marble structures on the sidewalk. Snapshots were exposed of Ryan Reynolds, Marilyn Monroe, Bob Hope, Lou Costello, Spencer Tracy, Donald Duck, Burt Reynolds, Julie Andrews, Tom Selleck, and Kevin Costner.

Moving along at 2:45 on Hollywood Boulevard, we passed Saddle Ranch Bar and Lazeraway before entering Beverly Hills. Again, tall palm trees were present as we passed the Beverly Hills Hotel and turned onto Rodeo Drive. The car drove by Neiman Marcus, I Love Tennis, and Saks Fifth Avenue businesses. We quickly made our way onto Wilshire Boulevard and Santa Monica Boulevard.

By 3:30 our voyage through continued Westwood Village and past the UCLA campus. We made our way onto San Vicente Boulevard and reached the Pacific Ocean twenty minutes later. At this elevated point, the ocean, the expansive beach, and the expensive beach front houses were 75 feet below us. Our next decision was to drive and park near the Santa Monica Pier and walk down the ramp to the end of it. I estimated the distance as one mile! The actual length was 1,651.5 feet or 500 meters. disagreed with this measurement.

Just to give my legs a rest, the Sunset Marina Sol Cantina looked like the best place to take a break and have dinner. My Chicken Tortilla soup with avocado and chips was the best selection to rejuvenate my body. But it hurt my credit card as it was my turn to pay. On the way back up the pier, we passed Bubba Gump restaurant, Japadog eatery, a sunglasses stand, and two businesses small that advertised, "Your Name on a piece of Rice." You guess!!

It was 5:50 when we left the pier area. Our car motored past the Metro Train Station, the downtown skyscrapers, the Crypto.com Arena where the LA Lakers play basketball, onto I-10-the Santa Monica Freeway, and the Museum of Flying. After that we followed the LA River to Orange Boulevard and back to Chapman Street. Bedtime was 9 pm.





Thank you to all the parents as well for allowing us to coach your kids.






