CHILD SAFETY

The kids have long since gone back to school and the holiday season is in full swing, but even with all the hustle and bustle, it's never a bad time to reevaluate how to keep your kids safe, and

do what you can to minimize potential accidents for your young ones. Use these safety tips and suggestions from the Federal Citizen Information Center and sleep (a little) sounder:

NEWS

Around the House:

AREA

- Your home is your sanctuary, but it can also have a bevy of unseen dangers for your children and your whole family. How clean and healthy is the air in your home? Use carbon monoxide and radon detectors to check gas levels.
- Check damp areas such as bathrooms, under kitchen sinks, in cellars and crawl spaces for moisture and mold, which can cause breathing problems, lead to illness, and worsen asthmarelated issues.
- Have your house inspected for <u>lead paint or pipes</u>. Lead can get into the air and water, and is potentially poisonous if breathed in or ingested by children.
- Do you use well water? Test your well each year to be sure it's free of unhealthy bacteria levels and chemicals.
- Inventory your cleaning supplies and be sure potentially harmful products that contain chemicals-like bleach, pesticides, and paint strippers are out of reach of children. Health and First Aid:

Get familiar with first aid techniques like the Heimlich Maneuver (abdominal thrusts) and CPR in case your child chokes or stops breathing.

As your children get

older, sit them down and have a frank discussion about the dangers of drinking alcohol. Be willing to listen to their concerns and answer their questions.

Encourage your kids to be active and healthy by participating in sports, but make sure they wear their protective gear like mouth guards, helmets, and shinguards to prevent injury. Accidents are never 100 percent preventable, but using these recommendations from the Federal Citizen Information Center can help keep your precious ones as safe as possible.

FARM MGMT PROGRAM

Farmers wanting to better educate themselves on sound business management practices should consider attending the Purdue Management Academy 2011 this winter.

The program takes place February 17th and 24th, and March 3rd, atten locations across Indiana. It is sponsored by Purdue University Extension and the North Central Risk Management Education Center. **Huntington County Courthouse** Annex Conference Room (2nd Floor) will be a host site for this program.

"Producers of family-owned, multigenerational agricultural operations are the intended audience," said Kelly Heckaman, Extension Educator, Purdue Extension Kosciusko County and the program coordinator.

"We are going to provide tools,

resources and a network for producers to create a strategic business management program for their individual operations," Heckaman said. "A Purdue Extension survey in 2008 found that our producers are requesting more information on product and enterprise diversification strategies, marketing plans and strategies, business and strategic planning, employee management and transition, and estate planning."

"Our goal has been to create a top-notch management education program for producers in Indiana who have multiple family members or employees in the operation. The plus is that they can do this right here in Indiana "

Session titles and topics include: • Feb. 17th: "Strategic Business ${\sf Planning''-Positioningthefarm}$ business, mission and vision statements, goal setting and measurement, business plan development and standard operating procedures.

- Feb. 24th: "Gathering and Utilizing Financial Information" — Measuring profitability, debt. managing using management accounting to link financial performance analysis, benchmarks and trends in financial information, and farm
- March 3rd: "Human Resources" — Enhancing workforce productivity and job satisfaction, communicating with family members and communicating with stakeholders.

Sessions will be conducted by a combination of Internet protocol (adobe connect) video broadcasts and live speakers at workshop locations. Keynote speakers appearing by video include Purdue agricultural economists Freddie Barnard, Mike Boehlje, Allan Gray and Chris Hurt; and



10 cups cooked macaroni, 3 tablespoon butter, 2 cloves chopped garlic, 1/3 cup flour, 4 cups milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon black pepper, dash ground nutmeg, 11/2 cups sharp cheddar cheese shredded, 1 pound mild seasoned ground sausage cooked and crumbled . 2 cups dry bread crumbs ,1 tablespoon butter.

In sauce pan melt butter add garlic and cook about 2 minutes over medium heat. Gradually add flour stirring till golden brown and whisk in milk stirring till mixture is thickened and smooth. Add salt, pepper and nutmeg and if too thick add little more milk. Add cheese and stir until melted and pour over the macaroni to coat. Spoon into a sprayed 9x13 baking dish . In another small bowl combine sausage, bread cruumbs and melted butter stir to coat, sprinkle over macaroni bake till hot and bubbly for about 15 minutes at 350. Cover with foil if it gets to brown Enjoy the holiday season.
