 $Epson\, salt\ around\, the\, planter\, and\, beds\, to\, give\, everything\, a\, boost.$ There will be no vegetable garden for methis year except to have tomato, pepper plant and a few hills of green beans, in the flower bed, thanks to a friend who shared some bean seed with me. As you can see I weakened and have to get my hands in the dirt.

This time of year at the old homestead dad and I would be planting potatoes and tilling up the rest of the garden for later planting. How I loved to be following behind him and my chore was picking out any small rocks or corn stalks from last year and also collecting fish worms for a later fishing trip to the creek for a bit of R&R.

Soon it will be time for mushrooming hopefully we get enough rain and moisture for them to be a productive sport this year. How I loved that time of year when I would be eager to go bring up the cows and while they always had to go out into the creek and stand forever. I would look for those wonderful morsels.

I would never take a sack along to put them in. It seemed the sack would bring me bad luck and never find any . So many times I just made a pouch out of the skirt of my dress and got along just fine, but it was a challenge to wade out in the creek with a skirt full of mushrooms and trying to get the dumb animals to move out and head toward the barn. Yes in my day we wore dresses and hardly knew what blue jeans were besides there was no room in the pockets. You could make good use of those dresses with full skirts. When mom fixed the mush rooms she sliced them in half and soakedthem in salt water to chase the bugs out and then fried them in pure home churned butter. That was some mighty fine eatin.

HUNTER EDUCATION

Indiana Conservation Officers are encouraging hunters to be safe this spring when taking to

the woods. Indiana Hunter Education is a good place to begin and is required in order to purchase a license for anyone born after December 31, 1986. A person unable to complete Hunter Education may purchase up to 3 Apprentice Licenses in his or her lifetime, which allows them to hunt with the assistance of a licensed hunter at least age 18. The DNR is offering free hunter education courses throughout the state. An online course is also available; however, there is a fee. A $complete \, list \, of \, up coming \, Hunter \,$ Education classes can be found online

www.passitonindiana.com.
Online registration is recommended to ensure a seat in the class.

The 2013 spring turkey season opensApril 24th and runsthrough May 12th. The youth spring turkey season is April 20-21. Hunters are allowed to take 1 male or bearded turkey during the regular spring season or during the youth season.

Indiana Conservation officers offer these safety TIPS for you to follow while turkey hunting:

- · Whistle or shout to alert approaching hunters of your position
- · Never wave or stand up.
- · Never sneak in on a turkey or use a gobbler call near other hunters.
- · Never crowd another hunter working a bird.
- · Never shoot at sound or movement.
- · Be extremely careful using turkey decoys.

· Do not wear red, white, or blue outer wear or exposed inner clothing.

· Don't assume you are the only hunter in the area.

- · Be certain of a hunting partner's location.
- \cdot Know and identify your target and what is beyond.
- · Always keep your gun pointed in a safe direction.
- · Always keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot.
- · Never use alcohol or drugs before or while hunting.
- \cdot Respect property rights and secure permission before hunting.
- · Hunters should unload their guns when crossing fences, climbing into stands, jumping ditches or traversing steep ravines.

During this season, many people are also in the woods searching for wild mushrooms. Before partaking in this seasonal activity, obtain permission from the landowner and ask if anyone has permission to Turkey Hunt. Even if you are the only person allowed to be in the woods, never assume you are out there alone. A mistake in property boundaries could put you in the woods with another Hunter. If you are hunting on state property, be sure to check that property's regulations for permitted activities and times.

Whether you are turkey hunting, mushroom hunting or enjoying a spring walk in the woods, be on the lookout for suspicious activity. Things you may come across include baited areas, marijuana grows. methamphetamine activity. Anyone with information regarding any suspicious activity or fish and wildlife violations are urged to contact Indiana Conservation Officer's Central Dispatch at 812-837-9536. TIMBER ADVICE

Indiana Conservation Officers and the DNR Division of Forestry are providing useful tips to landowners that can assist in protecting their valuable timber resources.

Indiana hardwoods, such as black walnut, red and white oak, and other valuable species are sought by the timber industry. Landowners should follow somesimple steps before signing a contract with a timber buyer.

"Some Indiana landowners are taken advantage of every year, and they lose money and resources because they are not aware of the value of timber or the steps needed to protect themselves," said Duane McCoy, timberlicensingforesterwiththe DNR Forestry.

To protect forestry resources, landowners should follow these steps:

Hire a consultant forester to represent you and mark and advertise your timber sale.

- 1. Always get several bids from different timber buvers.
- 2. Ask questions and get references from the timber
- 3. Mark the trees to be cut with a paint mark on the stem and at ground level.
- 4. Know and understand the fine details of the contract.

6. Know how much you will be paid and the method of payment.

7. Be a good neighbor and work out any property line disputes prior to harvesting.

"Marketing the mature timber from a family property is generally something that will only occur once in a person's lifetime, and it must be done with knowledge that protects the interest of your investment," said Lt. Tony Stoll, DNR Law Enforcement District commander.

The DNR offers a free information packet titled "callb4ucut" to Indiana citizens considering harvesting their timber.
