Get your motorcycles ready and get geared up for the 1st Annual Red Hatter Poker Run held on Saturday, July 3, 2004. Open to all motorcyclists everywhere. This is a combined poker run with registration taking place at the Warren Wagon Wheel, Warren, Indiana and River City Harley Davidson, New Haven, Indiana. All Proceeds from registrations at the Warren Wagon Wheel will go back to the Salamonie Summer Festival and proceeds from participants registering at River City Harley Davidson will go to Erin's House, Fort Wayne, Indiana. Since this is a combined poker run if you start at the Warren Wagon Wheel the poker run ends at the Warren Wheel. **JUNE 1-JULY 4: FIREWORKS SAFETY MONTH.**

Plan to make your 4th of July a safer celebration  
 Here are the best fireworks safety tips we can give you: Obey the law and use common sense.

Most parts of the U.S. have limitations on the types of fireworks that can be sold. You'll be safer if you follow the law and keep away from illegal fireworks.

Anything that will shoot, explode in the air, or spin uncontrollably should not be set off by an unauthorized person. Examples include Roman candles, firecrackers, bottle rockets, M -80s, and cherry bombs.

Even with legal fireworks, you really are playing with fire. Don't get burned. Think ahead of time about how you can follow these safety instructions:

- \* Choose a spot that is not near anything that can catch fire.
- \* Make sure kids under age 14 don't set off fireworks without adult supervision.
- \* Keep a bucket of water nearby. Use it for matches, spent fireworks, and to put out fires.
- \* When you light a fuse, move away quickly. If the fuse sputters or goes out, douse the device with water and move on to the next. Never try to relight a dud. It could explode in your face.
- \* Light fireworks on the ground, not in your hand. The fuse may burn faster than you realize it will. Douse used sparklers and other fireworks with water before picking them up. They could be very hot.
- \* Never drink alcoholic beverages while you are lighting fireworks. Drinking could alter your judgment.
- \* Light only one firework at a time.

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

"However, just spending a small amount of time with a child truly can change the entire course of that child's life for the better. Your interaction might mean the difference between a child dropping out of high school or going to college."

Bigs and Littles are encouraged to spend time together doing anything that promotes a positive interaction. Bigs and Littles often times will go to movies, out to eat, to the park or other fun outings. But Bigs and Littles also can spend time together just doing ordinary things like running errands, going to the grocery store, eating dinner with the family, or just hanging out.

BBBS of Northeast Indiana has served youth in the area for more than 30 years, and the program has proven that mentoring works. According to Big Brothers Big Sisters of America, children who have a mentor are 52 percent more likely to stay in school; 46 percent less likely to start using drugs; and 27 percent less likely to initiate alcohol use.

How does one become a Big? The agency's customer service philosophy is to serve adult volunteers as quickly and as conveniently possible. 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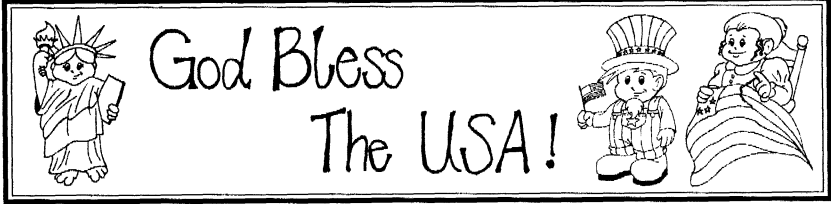

KIDS, SODA POP & TOOTH DECAY

We have become a "Soda Junkie" Society. In 2000 15 billion gallons were sold. That works out to at least one 12-ounce can per day for every man, woman and child. How does the soda give you cavities? Sugar in your soda plus bacteria in your mouth equals acid. Acid attacks your teeth. Each attack last about 20 minutes. Statistics for soda with acidity (lower number is worse) and sugar content!

60% of all public and private middle schools and high schools nationwide sell soda pop (Elem. Schools?). ### HONORED ONLINE

The Vietnam Memorial Wall in Washington, D.C. hosts thousands of visitors a year. Surviving Vietnam veterans find comfort in touching the etched names of friends who died in that faraway place, some over 30 years ago. Family members feel closer to the loved ones they lost. All are awed by the sheer size of The Wall and the number of names engraved.

Closer to home, thousands more visit the traveling Wall when it comes to a location near them.

The Virtual Vietnam Memorial Wall, launched on the Internet three years ago at [www.vvmf.org](http://www.vvmf.org), enables those who cannot travel to those locations the opportunity to experience some of the same comfort, maybe even more.

The real wall, with its massive black granite panels, while powerful in its presentation of the over 58,000 men and women who died in Vietnam, lacks one personal touch: a picture of that young person who gave his or her life in the name of freedom for the people of Vietnam. The Virtual Vietnam Memorial Wall offers family members, acquaintances or loved ones the opportunity to put a face with a name.

More than 2,500 photographs were collected for the permanent online photo collection on The Virtual Wall during a four-month campaign three years ago.

Jan C. Scruggs, founder and president of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund, says, "The 'Put a Face with a Name' campaign displays the magnitude of those killed in Vietnam and also shows that each of those servicemembers was a human being who was cut down in the prime of life, protecting the Ameri-

can values of democracy and freedom. We are committed to creating a complete online experience, featuring photographs of all whose lives were lost in Vietnam."

Tom Applegate, Huntington County Veterans' Service Officer, says that sixteen Huntington County men lost their lives while serving in Vietnam. "I visited the Virtual Wall Web site and found that, of the sixteen, three families had posted pictures. This would be a perfect time for the other families to add a picture, in time for the 30th anniversary next year of the end of the war in Vietnam."

Anyone who wishes to post a photo of a loved one or fellow veteran whose name appears on The Wall is encouraged to do so. Photos may be posted by using one of the following methods:

**\*\* Scan and upload the photos.** Visit the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund Web site at [www.vvmf.org](http://www.vvmf.org). Click on "Virtual Wall", then "Put a Name with a Face," and then "Post a Remembrance" and follow the directions provided.

**\*\* E-mail scanned images to VVMF.** Scan and e-mail photos as attachments (JPEG or GIF format preferred) to [vvmf@vvmf.org](mailto:vvmf@vvmf.org) with the subject, "Put a Face with a Name" in the body of the e-mail. Include the veteran's name, the sender's name, a password and any other information to be included.

**\*\* Mail a copy of the photograph to the Memorial Fund.** When mailing a copy of a photo - preferably not originals - to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund, include the information mentioned above as well as the sender's mailing address so the photo can be returned. Mail the information and photograph to: Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund, Attn: "Put a Face with a Name," 1023 15th St., N.W., Second Floor, Washington, D.C., 20005.

**\*\* Applegate has also volunteered his services to assist families in uploading photos to the Web site.** "Families can bring me the photo. I'll scan it and attach it to an e-mail to the website." 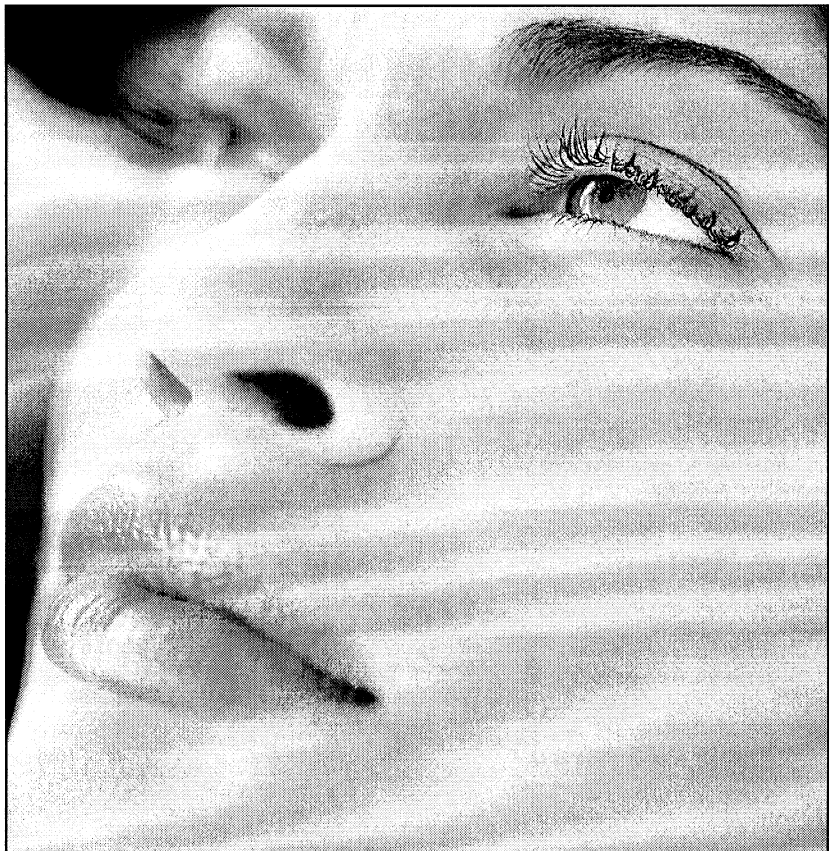
### SELECTED LEADER
