HOMESCHOOLERS

Huntington University's physical education students are offering a homeschool P.E. program for children K through 5th grade with a special preschool class for children ages 3 and 4 this fall.

Children will split into one of four developmental levels: preschool (ages 3 and 4), grades K-1, grades 2-3 and grades 4-5. The nine class sessions will be offered from September to December. Class time is from 2:15 to 3 p.m. in the fieldhouse of the university's Merillat Physical Education and

CHECKIN GAME

Deer and turkey hunters will have the option this fall to use an online system—CheckIN Game—that was developed for the Department of Natural Resources to help streamline the current harvest reporting process.

Hunters can report their deer and turkey harvest using the convenience of a computer, smart phone, or tablet that has Internet access without having to take the animal to a check station for physical inspection.

"The CheckIN Game system allows hunters to quickly report their game from the convenience of their home or directly in the field using their mobile device," said Mark Reiter, DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife director. "This free online system is a big step forward in giving hunters more options to check in their game." More than 2,100 turkey hunters took advantage of CheckIN

Hunters using CheckIN Game need to write the confirmation number they are provided on the temporary tag they have placed on their harvested deer or turkey. An enhancement to the system has been created that allows Indiana Conservation Officers to enter a confirmation number to check the validity of harvested game and eliminates the need for hunters to have a printed receipt of confirmation.

CheckIN Game will be available beginning with the urban zone deer season that opens Saturday (Sept. 15) in designated areas of Indiana and for all other deer and turkey seasons. For a list of hunting season dates, see Page 16 of the DNR's 2012 Indiana Hunting & Trapping Guide at www.in.gov/dnr/fishwild/2343.htm.

CheckIN Game was developed for the DNR by IN.gov, the official website of the state of Indiana and a service of the Indiana Office of Technology.

For those hunters who prefer the traditional check stations, more than 450 sites across the state will provide the service for reporting either deer or turkey. A complete county-by-county list of check stations can be

found on pages 38 to 43 in the DNR's 2012 Indiana Hunting & Trapping Guide at www.in.gov/dnr/fishwild/2343.htm.

HEALTHY TIPS

Last week we mentioned adding strength training to your work out to rev up your metabolism. This week let's talk about muscle recovery after your strength training. Here at 10 tips from Shape magazine.

Your post work out meal is the most important meal of the day. It should be eaten within 2 hours after resistance training and should consist of mainly protein and carbohydrates. Having a meal within 2 hours after resistance training increases hypertrophy and protein synthesis (muscle building)

Active recovery- is the most effective recovery method after exercise and consists of light resistance exercise to increase blood flow and nutrients to muscles after exercise it also helps by removing waste products that can hinder muscle recovery. Active recovery consist of walking, light biking, yoga, swimming or other low intensity exercises

Massage- (sports massage) is also beneficial to muscle recovery. It eases the onset of delayed muscle soreness.

Get your sleep- lack of sleep can inhibit muscle recovery by causing negative changes to feeding behavior and glucose metabolism and by causing an increase in cortisol (also known as the stress hormone) and a reduction in testosterone and insulin like growth factors. Lack of sleep can cause weight gain. Lack of sleep decreases protein synthesis (muscle building) which can hinder muscle recovery.

Increase your protein intake- it helps in building muscle over all and is a component of every cell you the human body. If you are a highly active individual or you have a low carbohydrate intake your protein demands will be higher.

Drink more water- can't say that enough. Your muscles are composed of about 75 percent water. You should be getting in at least a gallon of water a day. YES I SAID A GALLON. If you are active you may require even more.

Take time off- Every 8-12 weeks you should be looking at taking some time off from intense physical activity. Your muscles need time to repair. The time off is not set in stone, some say a week should provide enough time to fully repair muscles and recover your central nervous system. It is not possible to go at 100% 365 days a year. You need periods of rest to keep your intensity high and progress moving forward. Whether it is passive recovery (doing nothing) or active recovery (using lighter loads). You do need to give yourself a break once in awhile.

Make sure you stretch/cool down- A lot of people skip this part. It returns your heart rate to normal and removes lactic acid waste, which in turn provides for a more rapid recovery.

DON'T SMOKE- it impairs

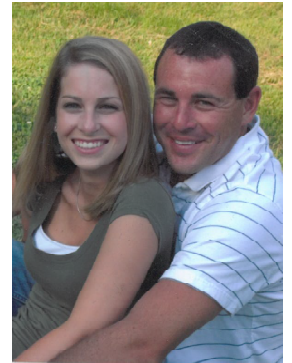

farmer...how could he communicate this idea.

And then it came to him. "I have a highly irritating bray that sometimes drives everyone in the barnyard crazy. If I start braying louder and longer than I ever have before maybe the farmer after he tries shouting and several other ways to silence me...maybe he will decide maybe shovelfuls of dirt will do the trick."

And that is how it happened. How in this obvious fairytale the mule was saved and salvaged.

And the thing is, in real life, if we work at shaking off our problems and adding in their place problem solving thoughts and life enriching deeds, it is amazing how much better life can be.

Problem solvers build roads as often or even more so than they simply travel them. They know that life has chasms and rivers and impediments of all sorts and sizes and they know that giving up only takes a bad problem and makes it worse.

Alfred Armand Montapert wrote, The majority see the obstacles; the few see the objectives; history records the successes of the latter, while oblivion is the reward of the former."

There are ways to handle problems. There really are. Got tons of them? Solve them one at a time. Pick out the one most serious and the one you feel needs your attention first and put the others on the back burner.

And sometimes the best thing to do first, is nothing. Take a walk around the block and simmer down. Sleep on it overnight.

Relax. It takes 30 seconds to move from stressful thinking to less. Play some music. That can speed up the process. Write a picture of your favorite pet across your mind. Imagine a waterfall with a mountain backdrop. Tense doesn't help one's reasoning powers.

In short, don't decide whether you want to continue to be a salesman after a week of poor sales. Sleep on it. Work at it. You may still decide you aren't cut out to be a salesman but you won't have rushed toward a life changing decision.

If you are a professional ball player don't decide to quit when

you are in a midst of batting slump.

Some problems really do get worse and need radical decisions but patiently, slowly thinking through problems certainly up the odds that you may well come up with a solution you would have never seen if you had rushed the process.

And consider problems a friend in disguise. They test your mettle and in the process allow you to get a good look at yourself in a way you never can when everything is going right.

I have learned so much from my failures and my pains and my illnesses and the chain of adversities that have sometimes assaulted me. I have learned not to let them beat me down. I have not enjoyed them. But I have learned from them.

Sometimes in my waiting and

learning time I have suddenly seen a problem in a new light. Time is a wonderful teacher. It really is.

Sometimes, to help my insight, I have gone searching in biographies both secular and sacred to find out what others did when faced with a similar problem. It isn't always necessary to reinvent the wheel.

I have sought and found humility rather than let pride make me a fool. I have gone to another person and asked for their advice and sometimes taken it because their thinking was far better and clearer than had been mine.

"Don't keep doing the same thing and expect different results." I have tried to learn from my mistakes and not repeat them. Be they economic, educational or otherwise...the lesson of experience quickly raises its head and speaks. We just have to be wise enough to listen.
