### COUNCIL NEWS

The Van Buren Town Council met on Wednesday evening, January 27. The meeting was held in the Council Room at Town Hall. President Tony Manry called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. with all repeating the Pledge to the American Flag.

Most of the citizens in attendance were concerned about progress being made to clean up properties. One citizen had started cleaning up their property, then stopped. They were given until February 8 to complete the job. If they fail to comply they will be cited into court.

Officer Pat Collins gave the Police Report. In his report he said he had talked with the individual who had stopped work on his property.

Council passed Resolution 1-2016, authorizing town acceptance of land.

There was discussion about people parking the wrong way and too close to corners causing difficulty for motorists to see oncoming traffic.

Council reappointed Robert Turner to the Library board for a four year term from July 2015 to July 2019.

Council accepted a resignation letter from Deputy Marshal Andrew Bowell.

Donnie Plummer gave the Utility report. A permit had been received from I&M Power to relocate dpower lines at the water plant.

Council approved a quote to have the South water tower inspected. Quotes had been submitted for the pump station at the water plant.

There was a discussion about water bill readjustments.

John Brane had put together a Van Buren Do It group to decorate the downtown area for summer.

**FIGHTING THE FEELING THAT YOU JUST DON'T FIT IN**

 Our society places a large value on being popular. Television, movies and magazines tend to focus on "winners," people who excel at what they do and seem to be loved and/or respected by everyone around them.

But many of us are plagued by the anxiety that comes with not really being sure of where we stand with others. We may fear that someone is only pretending to like us while actually criticizing us negatively or laughing at us behind our backs.

If you're a parent, you've most likely heard these feelings from your child. When he or she comes from school complaining that "Nobody likes me!" or "I don't have any friends!" you are usually aware that what is being said isn't the full picture. But you also see how painful and traumatic the perceived situation is for your child.

Such feelings are a natural part of a child's development. Puberty and early adolescence have children facing a number of physical and emotional changes that, while a normal part of development, can leave a child feeling insecure and frightened.

As parents, we can help overcome these fears and related feelings by showing patience and understanding. When we listen carefully to complaints and offer positive advice, we can help a child get past his or her insecurity. The key is not to dismiss your child's concerns, but instead to offer positive, reassuring feedback without being critical or judgmental.

But this isn't just a childhood problem. Many adults also face feelings of anxiety and insecurity. Someone may believe he or she can't make friends and feels uncomfortable in social situations. A common feeling can be that everything you say or do is being critiqued or judged and that you are constantly found to be falling short.

While it's perfectly normal to have such thoughts and feelings at various times, if they have become almost constant and have you withdrawing from work and social situations, avoiding family and neighbors, or always trying to not be noticed so you won't be judged, the problem is a serious one that can lead to harmful depression.

**ANNIVERSARY DINNER**

Love in the Name of Christ is celebrating the completion of 30 years of service in Huntington County with a dinner at 6:30 pm on Thursday, February 18, 2016 at the Lafontaine Center. The cost of the dinner is \$15.00 per person and is a fundraiser for the group's many programs. Tickets need to be purchased by February 12, 2016, and the board is seeking table sponsors. The meal will be catered by Kim's Katered Affairs, and there will be entertainment as well as a silent auction of various items and is definitely open to the public.

Love INC started in 1985 when the churches in the county discovered that their ministries to help people were overlapping and not run as efficiently as they would like. Sister Mary Paula Fortier, a retired nun at Victory Noll, was familiar with Love in the Name of Christ at the national level and suggested that the Huntington County group of churches affiliate with it. She acted as the first director along with the first board of directors, who consisted of Reverend Ray Scribner, Susan Solloway, Doris Smitley, Robert Whitesell, and Rev. Kent Young. The only programs at that time were a food pantry and few items of

clothing and household goods .The board and other volunteers first worked out of the UB Building and later moved to the present site on Byron Street and the ministries grew over the years to also include a clothing program and financial referrals and mentoring.

Love INC staff is presently headed by Director Joey Spiegel with Ministry Coordinator Kyle Metzger, temporary food pantry director Terry Rodgers, and Janet Troyer, Clearing House Coordinator. The Board of Directors consists of Jesse Brown, Nancy Carender, Rev. Mark Davis from Warren, Karen Farber, Cindy Krumanaker, Mike McElhanay, Jo Ellen Morris, Jerry Phelps, Doug Selig, Daved Walker, Trent Wolfe, and Joey Spiegel. Volunteers man the food pantry and clothing ministries and interview callers over the phone in the Clearing House to determine how best to meet their needs. Love INC hopes to continue serving Huntington County for the next 30 years and more.

Love INC is an organization which works in coordination with many churches and provides several ministries for people in need who live in Huntington County. The most active ministry is the Love Food Pantry, which provides food and essential household and personal supplies for individuals and families in need. Another vital ministry is Covered with Love, which provides clothing and household goods at little or no cost. There is a large inventory of gently used and

new clothing for all ages and sizes. The items have all been donated by individuals or other organizations. A third ministry, called Loving Neighbors, is a program to aid individuals and families with budgeting and financial decisions. Mentors work long term in each case, and there are money management classes for people to attend. All of the ministries are manned by volunteers and cost the people nothing.

Two special projects that Love INC sponsors are Back to School and the Christmas Project. Back to School provides donated new and gently used clothing "from the skin out" for school age children. Love INC collects toys from donors for The Christmas Project, and each family who qualifies pays \$5.00 per child or \$20.00 per family and may pick out gifts for their children.

**DIABETES CAMP**

Camp John Warvel offers traditional camp activities as well as constant medical assistance for children living with diabetes. It is for children ages 7 to 15 with type 1 or type 2 diabetes. Older teens with previous diabetes camp experience may participate as counselors-in-training.

This year's camp will run from June 5 to 11, 2016. Registration is now open at [www.diabetes.org/adacampjohnwarvel](http://www.diabetes.org/adacampjohnwarvel). Last year 176 campers attended Camp John Warvel, which takes place at the YMCA Camp Crosley facility in North Webster.

"I encourage all my young patients living with diabetes to go, camp allows them the opportunity to see other children just like them living with diabetes. My son came home and started using new injection areas. There are

education points, learning daily life skills, teambuilding and encouragement. It's about setting life goals – not just diabetes goals. It's a great way to get information on diabetes, have a lot of fun, and build friendships that last forever," said Christina Pogue, nurse practitioner and mother to camper.

Children living with diabetes face unique daily challenges, including frequent finger sticks to check blood glucose levels, injections to replace the insulin that their bodies cannot make or process, and daily vigilance to prevent complications such as heart disease, stroke, kidney disease, blindness, amputations and early death.

Previous camper, Rachel McLaughlin, shares, "Camp is what made me the person I am today. Camp is where I learned to take care of myself on my own, but was still under phenomenal supervision!"

Diabetes education is the main focus for children attending Camp John Warvel. Camp activities such as water sports, rock climbing, high ropes courses, horseback riding, and more teach children how to manage their blood glucose levels during physical activity. Campers also learn a variety of techniques for managing their diabetes, including counting carbohydrates at meals. Camp

existing cards and transfer them to another credit card, usually at a lower rate. This new lower rate helps to reduce your level of debt because more of your monthly payment will go toward paying off debt principal, rather than paying interest.

"A balance transfer at a low rate makes it easier to pay down your balance, improving your debt-to-credit ratio as your balance decreases," said Randy Hopper, vice president of credit cards at Navy Federal Credit Union.

Reducing your debt sounds great, but wouldn't it be awesome to be debt-free? To truly benefit from a balance transfer, follow these simple tips:

Know when a deal isn't actually a deal

Typically, credit card issuers charge a fee associated with a balance transfer. This could be a flat fee per number of transfers, or percentage of the total balance you're bringing over to the new card.

"Keep an eye out for balance transfers with no fees, zero percent interest during the introductory period and a low rate after the intro period expires," Hopper says. This is where you can really make a difference to your credit score, but make sure you select a card that will give you enough time to pay down your balance in full.

Be sure to read the fine print on the zero percent offers, too. It could be in your best interest to choose a 2.99 percent APR that doesn't have a balance transfer fee, over a zero percent offer with a three percent fee. In the long run, it could cost you more than you're saving.

Consolidate from high to low

If you've got several credit cards and have trouble managing payments, consolidate to one card. You can save money on interest by moving your higher balances into this new account with a lower interest rate. Check the APR on all your credit cards to know which ones would be best for a balance transfer.

"This is a great option for store cards that usually have high interest rates, where credit unions never charge more than 18 percent," Hopper says.

Once you've consolidated your credit card debt, avoid making purchases until your debt is paid down. Remember, your goal is to become debt free. Making any new purchases will start accruing interest immediately, which isn't ideal.

Always pay on time  
Make your payments on time or you could be hit with a penalty APR. Not only do missed payments negatively affect your credit score, but you could risk losing the low introductory rate as well. Forgoing your intro period APR could mean missing your goal of becoming debt-free.

"If possible, set up automatic payments along with alerts on your mobile device to ensure payments are made on time," says Hopper. "Maintaining a healthy track record will boost your credit score."

You'll lose them if you don't use them

Finally, when your balance hits zero, keep the account open. Doing so indicates your track record of reliability. As a general rule, credit cards that are in good standing over a long period of time positively impact your credit score. The longer these accounts are open, the better it is for your profile.

If you're looking for a lower interest rate, a simplified payment process, or both, balance transfers are for you. Reducing your credit card debt is within reach. With a good payoff plan and the right card, you could become debt-free sooner than you think!
