COUNCIL NOTES

The Town Council of the Town of Warren met Monday, March 13, 2023 in a Regular Meeting at Assembly Hall, Council Meeting Room, 131 N. Wayne St, in accordance with rules of Council and applicable law.

Minutes of Regular Meeting of February 13 were approved as submitted.

Citizen's Comment – Statement on Electric outages.

Marshal Spitler submitted February activity report and reported that Police Vehicle is scheduled to be delivered by end of April.

Fire Chief Poulson submitted February activity report and requested Council approval of addition of Cole Hacker and Andrew Boxell to

the Department. Approved by consensus.

Chamber of Commerce – Jeff Souder requested that in order to move the Riverside Project forward that Council consider supplying four concrete underground electric boxes. Surfus moved, seconded by Buzzard, to supply the boxes from stock on hand. The motion was approved unanimously.

Historic Warren – Announced that Huntington County Commissioners had approved a grant in the amount of \$24,973.00 to be used toward certain repairs on the recently acquired 'The Exchange' building.

Ordinance 2023-1, Fixed Asset Policy, as introduced on March 13th, submitted for consideration of adoption. Buzzard moved, seconded by Surfus, to adopt. Motion approved unanimously.

SPRING HAS SPRUNG!!!! And boy am I glad. I'm just not much on winter even though we really haven't had any bad ones in the past several years. I mean like the one year when we were in the frozen tundra, I thought it was never gonna warm up or we have been buried in lots and lots of snow, I'm talking blizzards with big measurable snow. Really we have been lucky.

This past week was the National Weather Service week and Monday they sounded all the sirens in the county at once. And I can assure you the Town of Warren is prepared for the severe weather. So I hope that everyone heard the sirens, if not they check them every 1st Wednesday of the month at noon. So be sure you listen and make sure you are aware of what it sounds like and if you hear it, take cover, especially if bad weather is approaching.

We were talking this week about some of the bad storms we have had over the years. Of course the Palm Sunday tornadoes were at the top of the list but I can remember a few that were pretty wicked. When we lived out on Monroe street, we had a really doozie of a storm. Mom was sitting on the couch with us and I can remember looking out the window and it was horribly black outside. Just then the basement door that was right around the corner opened up and slammed shut. I screamed and screamed, it scared me so bad. Now mind you I was 3 or 4 but I remember it like it was yesterday. The wind outside forced an upward thrust that popped the door open and when the wind retracted it slammed the door shut. Nowadays I would have been a little concerned that it would have took the house and blew it upwards.

So ill just share a few tips of what you need to do in a bad weather situation.

1. If the sirens blow that is a fair warning that you need to take cover in a basement or an inside room, like one that is in the middle of the house. Every home is different so in our case we have a closet as the interior room that runs under the stairway. Define an interior room, a room that does not have a wall that is on the outside of the home. Its walls are all inside the home. And avoid windows and doors with glass. Think of it this way, when a tornado comes through, the exterior walls will fall like a house made of cards. The roof comes off and the exterior walls come down.

2. If you are in a vehicle, exit the vehicle and lay as flat as possible in a ditch as low as you can get and be aware of water filling the ditch from torrential downpours. Do not stay in your vehicle or even under your vehicle, they become airborne quick.

Morrison reported that difficulties in reconciling Invoice Cloud batches to Bank Deposits has been resolved through work with Invoice Cloud and a Clerk-Treasurer who had used the system for over a year. Bank Statements are all reconciled and a complete report of January, February, and March will be submitted for Council consideration at the April meeting.

Poulson reviewed projects and reported that steel had been received for the repair of the utility barn at 316 W. Second with work scheduled to begin before the end of the month.

Award of Community Crossings Grants are scheduled to be made by late March or early April. The Town has applied for a grant to reconstruct Wayne Street from SR 5 to Eleventh Street. Scheduling of additional projects will be made following that determination.

NEW NATURE PRESERVE

New property marks Indiana's 298th nature preserve. The Natural Resources Commission (NRC) approved the dedication of Limberlost Swamp Nature Preserve, which is located across Adams and Jay counties during its regularly scheduled bi-monthly meeting at Fort Harrison State Park today.

This 719.23-acre nature preserve includes a parking area and more than 3 miles of walking trails. A variety of birds can be found at the site, including short-eared owls, Northern harriers, waterfowl, migrating shorebirds, sandhill cranes, and bald eagles.

Indiana's nature preserves provide permanent protection for significant

natural areas within the state. The action increases the number of state-designated sites protected by the Nature Preserves Act to 298, representing more than 53,000 acres of protected land.

The NRC is an autonomous board that addresses topics pertaining to the DNR. More details on this and other actions are available <https://www.in.gov/nrc/meetings-and-minutes/current-meeting-agenda/>.

The next regularly scheduled NRC meeting is May 16, also at Fort Harrison State Park.

NRC members include the DNR director, heads of three other state agencies (Indiana Department of Environmental Management, Indiana Destination Development Corporation, and the Indiana Department of Transportation), six citizens appointed by the governor on a bipartisan basis, the chair of the DNR's advisory council, and the president of the Indiana Academy of Science. The Academy of Science president and the agency heads, other than the DNR director, may appoint proxies to serve the commission in their absences.

A DAY TRIP TO SEDONA, AZ

On February 2, 2023 (GroundHog Day), my wife, son, and I departed southern Phoenix at 9:15 am. The start-time decision for the northerly, 120 mile trek was made to avoid rush hour traffic. We are old but still have some common sense. Two miles from home our rental car merged onto I-10 West where it passed Wild Horse Pass Blvd. and Sundust Road before locating I-17 North.

Before long, the Synthetic Grass Company was sighted and we passed under Camelback Road before entering the city limits of Glendale, AZ. After motoring past Cactus Rd. and a roller coaster dominated fun park, we were out of the Phoenix area and suddenly surrounded by cactus-covered mountains. The foothills were punctuated with a vast number of homes. As a byword, all the surrounding areas of Phoenix are monopolized by thousands of homes and matching shopping malls!

We sped past Horse Thief Basin and Bumble Bee Road before climbing to 3,000 ft. elevation and a plateau. The terrain was devoid of cacti twenty minutes later, but sagebrush was the standard. We began to see some snow on the distant mountain

peaks. Even though the area seemed desolate, a cell phone tower and power lines were present. Evergreen trees came into view.

At the Camp Verde exit, Highway # 260 led us northwest toward Cottonwood, AZ. I counted 7 roundabouts in twelve miles of sparsely populated space. Future development expected? We traveled by Dead Horse State Park which was surrounded by the vast Coconino National Forest. More snow was visible on the north sides of the mountains as we entered the east part of Cottonwood. We drove past the Black Bear Diner and Rocking Chair Road as Highway # 89A headed northeast towards Sedona which was only 10 miles away. It was 50 degrees. Flagstaff was another 19 miles.

Very quickly, the expected color of the red rock formations came into view. My son drove slowly through the extended village of Sedona and onto Highway # 179 South to the renowned Chapel of the Holy Cross. It is a Catholic chapel that was built into the mountain butte and completed in 1956. After visiting that site, we returned to Sedona for lunch at the Golden Goose Restaurant. My son had researched the place, but without a prominent sign, it

was difficult to locate. Perseverance paid off however.

It just so happened that that establishment was directly across the street from the one-and-only McDonald's in the world with Blue Arches! The city council thought that golden arches would distract from the natural red hue of the community. A compromise of a light blue color was accepted.

Sedona was considered a spiritual area for the Native American tribes of Yavapai, Apache, Hopi, & Navajo. Many still believe that it is a center for energy, healing, and meditation. In 1876, ranching and some limited farming took place. The old town area now houses tourist shops, art galleries, restaurants, and overnight accommodations that overlook Oak Creek. It lies at 4,350 ft. in elevation and has a population of 9,700.

In the area, Dry Creek Rd. took us past three, stacked pillars called Chimney Rocks and stopped at the Devil's Bridge trail head. This natural bridge was covered with

snow two weeks earlier. It was 59 degrees today. The 3.6 mile, 2-3 hour hike was not feasible today. Other notable rock formations visited from a distance today were the Cathedral Rock, the Rabbit Ears, & the Bell Rock. The distinct color of this area is due to iron oxide weathering through time. A view of Sedona from the

Airport Overlook was impressive.

We headed south at 4 pm. but stopped for dinner north of Phoenix to again avoid rush hour traffic. Arrived home at 7:30.

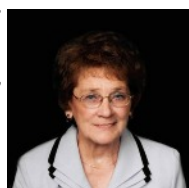

Calling hours will be on Friday, March 17, 2023, from 5 to 7 p.m. at Central Christian Church, 500 MacGahan St., Huntington.

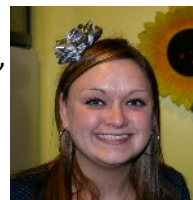

3. Wait for an all clear sign or the storm is over before resuming back to the upper level of your home or back into your vehicle. If you have damage be sure to report it to your insurance company right away. If there is significant damage be sure to stay away from downed power lines and trees. Just because the storm is over doesn't mean the damage is, houses can continue to fall along with the trees and powerlines. Always be aware of your surroundings.

4. By all means don't be a true Hoosier and welcome the storm in from the front porch. I know we all do it, but leave that to the trained professionals and the weather spotters. You and your family's safety is your number 1 priority. When they tell you to take shelter, do so and don't waste time.

Grab your wallets, purses and cell phones and get to safety and always keep a supply box in your safe area with bottled water, first aid kit, NOAA radio, flashlight with batteries.

5. After the storm, if your neighborhood has sustained heavy damage, be a good neighbor and help those that need help the most. A tornado is very unpredictable; it can hit one house and destroy it and miss the next one. So before entering any home or building, be sure it is stable and if you are rescuing people be careful every step of the way.

Derecho weather systems can be just as dangerous as a tornado. They are long lived straight line winds that can be extremely damaging and can cause just as much damage as a tornado. So if you hear a report that they are coming your way, always take shelter like you would in a tornado.

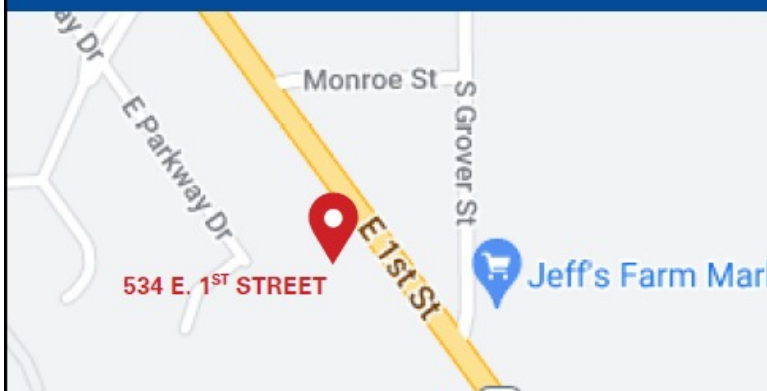
