HONORING VETERANS

The Huntington University Foundation breakfast on Wednesday, Nov. 9, will honor area veterans and servicemen and women currently serving in the military. The theme for the breakfast will be "Service to God and Country." All servicemen and women attending will be recognized and provided with a free breakfast. Prior RSVP is requested.

"I hope you can join us for this special breakfast meeting as we pay tribute to those who have served and are currently serving our country to protect our freedom," stated Holly Sale, Foundation president.

Col. Patrick R. Renwick, Commander of the Indiana Air National Guard's 122nd Fighter Wing, Fort Wayne, Indiana, will give an update on the guard's mission, training, deployment, redeployment and overall readiness as the U.S. military continues to battle the global war on terrorism.

Col. Renwick began his military career in November 1988 with the United States Air Force when he was selected to attend Officer Training School at Medina Annex, Lackland AFB, Texas. He earned his commission of Second Lieutenant in March of 1989 and immediately attended Undergraduate Pilot Training at Vance Air Force Base, Oklahoma. Col. Renwick served as an A/OA-10 Forward Air Controller, Instructor Pilot, Combat Search and Rescue Pilot, Squadron and Group Scheduler, Chief of Standardization and Evaluation and Flight Safety Officer while on active duty. In 1998 he transitioned to the Indiana Air National Guard, 181st Fighter Wing, Terre Haute, Indiana, as an Assistant Flight Commander for the F-16C.

Col. Renwick has held various positions in the Indiana Air National Guard including Weapons and Tactics Officer, Assistant Flight Commander, 113th Fighter Squadron Chief of Training, 113th Air Support Operations Squadron Commander, 181st Intelligence Wing Vice Commander. Col. Renwick was promoted to his current rank in December of 2011.

The Foundation breakfast is held on the second Wednesday of each month, October through May, and is open to the public. It will begin at 7:45 a.m. in the Habecker Dining Commons and conclude by 9:00 a.m. The cost of the breakfast is \$10, a portion of which will help support the Huntington County Grant. First-time attendees eat free courtesy of Bailey-Love Mortuary. Foundation breakfasts occur on the second Wednesday of the month, October through May. If you were born after Dec. 31, 1986, be sure to enter your hunter education number in the profile page in your online account. The number is required to purchase a standard deer hunting license. You can find your hunter education number at dnr.IN.gov/lawenfor/7721.htm

muzzleloader, and special antlerless seasons combined using legal equipment, including crossbows. State offices will be closed on Friday, Nov.11 for the Veteran's Day holiday, so buy your license now. Firearms season runs from Nov. 12-27.

NEW OPTIONS
Still scratching your head over what's legal and what isn't in the new rifle regulations for deer hunting in Indiana this year?

Here are three questions that will guide you to the correct answers:
1. Does the rifle have a barrel at least 16 inches long?
2. Is the rifle chambered to fire a cartridge with a case length of at least 1.16 inches?
3. Does that cartridge fire a bullet that is either .243 inches or .308 inches in diameter (or their metric equivalents, 6mm and 7.62mm, respectively)?

If the answer is yes to all three, then it's legal under HEA 1231, a law passed earlier this year by the State Legislature.

If the answer is "no" to any of those three questions, it does not meet the HEA 1231 standards for new rifle options.

Remember: Bullet diameter, cartridge case length and barrel length are the determining factors of this law.

Any bullet smaller than .243 (6mm), larger than .308 (7.62mm), or in between .243 and .308 does not qualify. Neither does a cartridge with a case length that is less than

1.16 inches, or a rifle with a barrel shorter than 16 inches. Here's a twist, though. Some cartridges may appear to fall outside the allowable .243 and .308 requirements because of how they are labeled.

Take the .240 Weatherby Magnum, for instance. Disregard the .240 label because the bullet diameter actually is .243 inches and therefore legal to use.

Similarly, .30, .30-06 and .300-caliber cartridges are legal because their bullet diameters are .308 inches.

A few more points:
• The new rifle options can be used only on private land.
• Full-metal jacketed bullets are illegal.
• A hunter can possess only 10 of these legal rounds while in the field.
• There is no tree-stand requirement to use the new rifle options.

The new law does not change regulations previously approved for centerfire rifles chambered for so-called pistol cartridges. Those regulations allow for rifles chambered for cartridges that fire a bullet of .357-inch diameter or larger and have a case length of 1.16 inches to 1.8 inches. Unlike the new high-caliber rifle options, these can be used on private and public land to hunt deer.
