**TOOTH TIPS**

**DOES THE FOOD I EAT CAUSE DECAY??**

The food that you chew and eat leaves a residue in your mouth (plaque) and nothing could make the bacteria that live in your mouth happier. Bacteria love the sugars and starch found in many foods. If you don't brush and floss your teeth thoroughly after eating, bacteria will use the sugars and starch to produce acids that can eat through the enamel. (The hardest substance in your body) on your teeth. After a while tooth decay begins. The more often you eat and the longer the food residue stays in your mouth, the greater the potential for damage. This is the reason sipping "pop" all day is such a problem.

There are foods that are good for you but still are high in sugar and starch such as fruit, milk, bread, cereal and even vegetables. You don't have to avoid these foods. They are a part of a balanced diet but keep in mind those foods eaten as part of a meal as opposed to a snack, cause less harm because you produce more saliva during a meal. The saliva helps wash food residue from the mouth and lessens the impact of acids. Finally, limit your snacks. Each time you eat food or drink pop with sugar or starch, acids attack your teeth for 20 minutes or more.

mental health services at shelter sites.

Many of the above will be required to complete the Red Cross CPR/First Aid class, which will be provided at no cost. All required additional training will also be provided at no cost. Please call the chapter at 260-356-2910 to let us know you will be attending. Everyone is encouraged to attend, whether you call us or not. If you are interested in the session, but cannot attend at this time, please call and tell us. If there is enough interest, a weeknight session will be held the following week.

## MEDICARE PRESCRIPTION DRUG BENEFIT

Beginning May 3rd, Medicare eligible patients will be inundated with dozens of offers for Medicare-approved Prescription Drug Discount Cards. Not everyone needs to have one of these plans. Many patients already have Prescription Drug coverage through an existing insurance plan. Some already have a discount card that costs them little, or nothing, through another source. **Extreme caution** must be used in choosing a Medicare-approved plan, if you want one. Some Pharmacies may be excluded from some plans.

The Federal government does not control each plan, but has laid down only a few guidelines about how each plan must operate. The annual fee for a plan may not exceed \$35. If a Drug manufacturer gives a rebate or a discount on a drug, some of that amount must be passed on to the patient (this is where one card may differ greatly from another, depending upon how much money they give back to you). Many of the dis-

counts will be funded directly by your Pharmacy. The Federal Government will subsidize low-income seniors (singles with incomes below \$12,569 or married couples below \$16,862) with up to a \$600 annual allowance. Each card will have at least an annual commitment, so if you choose the wrong card for you, you may have to wait until the next enrollment period.

You may enroll in one program only, beginning May 3rd. Enrolling in a Medicare-approved drug discount card is your choice. The cards will begin to be effective on June 1, 2004.

You may want to talk with your local Pharmacy before you commit yourself to a plan. You can call 1-800-MEDICARE (633-4227) to get help evaluating cards or visit [www.medicare.gov](http://www.medicare.gov) for more information.

Residents are provided an objective, independent representative to investigate and resolve complaints made by them or on their behalf.

Our current Long-Term Care

Ombudsman, Daisy Schmidt, serves a nine county area in North-east Indiana which include the following counties: Adams, Allen, DeKalb, Huntington, LaGrange, Noble, Steuben, Wells, and Whitley. With so much area to cover and so many facilities to visit, the area ombudsman cannot do the job alone. The current volunteer team consists of seven dedicated members who serve as volunteer ombudsmen in nine area facilities. They serve approximately 10% of the residents in the nine county areas. But, the need exists to have more volunteers in more facilities.

As a certified volunteer ombudsman they are able to:

- Introduce residents and their families to the Ombudsman pro-

gram.

• Promote the rights of each resident.

• Educate and empower residents to ensure their rights.

• Emphasize individual dignity and self-determination.

• Assist residents and their families in voicing their concerns by their consistent presence.

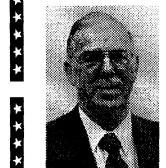
• Observe and report general conditions within the nursing home setting.
