REMEMBERING THE WAR TO END ALL WARS

At the stroke of the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918 the roaring guns fell silent. Our holiday that marks the end of "The Great War" is now called Veterans' Day, yet it's worth taking a moment to recollect when it was called Armistice Day and meant more than midnight madness sales at department stores.

Thirty million soldiers were killed or wounded and another 7 million were taken captive in that war. Never before had people witnessed such industrialized slaughter. Congress responded to a universal hope among Americans that such a war would never happen again by passing a resolution calling for "exercises designed to perpetuate peace through good will and mutual understanding...inviting the people of the United States to observe the day in schools and churches with appropriate ceremonies of friendly relations with all other peoples." Later, Congress added that November 11 was to be "a day dedicated to the cause of world peace."

While it is a good thing to honor the country's military service veterans, the original intent of Armistice Day — promoting peace has gotten lost over the years. One veterans' organization is trying to recreate that original intent. Its name, appropriately enough, is Veterans For Peace.

Of the many veterans' organizations in the U.S., Veterans For Peace (VFP) exists specifically to carry out the original purpose of Armistice Day. With 120 chapters across the country, the St. Louisbased organization has as its chief goal "to abolish war as an instrument of national policy."

Founded in 1985 at the height of the Reagan administration's support for the "contras" in Nicaragua and death squads elsewhere in Central America, VFP includes men and women veterans of all eras and wars — cold or hot — from World War II through the current wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

One of the things of which the organization is most proud is helping form Iraq Veterans Against the War in the summer of 2004, but Elliott Adams, VFP's president and a former paratrooper who served in Vietnam, will quickly tell you they are not interested in repeating that accomplishment. "I'll be happy if this generation of veterans is the last," he says.

Having seen the reality of war and understanding its true cost, VFP members will tell you that war is not the answer. However, coming to that conclusion is as much a spiritual journey as a political one, they acknowledge, because making peace in your heart can sometimes be as difficult as making peace in the world.

One of the simple truths on which Veterans For Peace is founded states, "Our collective experience tells us wars are easy to start and hard to stop." With a weary nod of the head the doughboys of WWI, shivering in the soggy, rotten trenches of Europe in November 1918, would surely have agreed.

I can hardly believe that November is here and having the great warm weather. This is known as Indian Summer. Grandpa always said you have to have Squaw Winter before you have Indian Summer and I think we had that last week with the cold and bit of snow.

Soon it will be time for the basketball games to start which we enjoy at our house. For the most part the games today don't compare to the Hoosier Hysteria we had when I was in school. Most often it took all the boys in the high school to make up the teams. The competition among the 12 township schools was always very exciting and was the highlight of the winter activities at school. It seemed the first snowfall always came the night of our first ballgame. We lived a short distance from the school and always walked to the games. My sister and I would walk down the old dirt road quarter mile from the school and had to pass between 4 barns that was sometimes a bit scary, especially if ole Mr. Taylor had his mean old bull in the field by the road. He had him on a chain and a short log to keep him under control but he did get away often. We walked pretty fast past him day or night. There was no street lights and we never carried a flash light but we knew every



COUNCIL NOTES

The Warren Town Council met at 4 p.m. Monday, October 27 in Assembly Hall. The meeting was conducted by President Bill Cartwright.

Minutes of the regular meeting of September 27 were approved as submitted. The October 13 meeting had been cancelled.

Glessner reported on progress to date on a landscape plan for the municipal parking lot at the corner of First and Main Streets. Council will consider the adjusted auote.

Resolution 1-2008, a Resolution to transfer \$10,000 from the **Electricity Utility to the General** Fund in lieu of taxes was approved

by Council; Resolution 2-2008, a resolution establishing a holiday schedule for 2009 was approved, establishing use of the dormant Arts Festival Fun, as per State Auditor's recommendation was approved.

Ordinance 2008-8, 9, and 10, Ordinances establishing wages and benefits for 2009, were introduced. Council agreed to take quotes for clothing and other items from rental services. At least two companies are expected to present quotes.

Council discussed a request to use Tower Park for a Goat Show. A qualified approval was expected to be given pending impact on Town insurance and more details.

Pulse Opera House had submitted a letter, a program to sell Christmas Wreaths. After discussion, Council approved.

Because of a problem with feral cats, especially in the area of Sixth and Nancy Streets, Council asked Marilyn Morrison to contact Basic Wildlife of Huntington to discuss removal. Due to barking dog complaints which had been received, Marshal Spitler was to issue citations.

Morrison reported the bi-annual audit of the State Board of Accounts had been completed. Curtis Day gave the September activity report. Leaf Pick-up is underway. Equipment has been winterized.

Quotes had been received for a 2008 small bucket truck as follows: UTE \$99,750; UTE \$101,950; NESCO \$111,900. Specs had not been issued as an already built truck was being sought. After discussion, Council approved the purchase of the \$150,750.

Day also reported that a sign had been purchased for the municipal parking lot.

Fire Chief Poulson reported the Department is in need of three helmets. Council agreed to the purchase. Poulson also requested a meeting be scheduled with the Township Advisory Board to continue discussion related to purchase of a new fire truck.

SEEK VOLUNTEERS

The Indiana Association of Area Agencies on Aging (IAAAA) and its 16 regional members are seeking volunteers to help Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries become better health care consumers.

Under a program called the SMP Project in Indiana which is funded by a grant from the Administration on Aging, Department of Health and Human Services, SMPs recruit and teach senior volunteers and professionals such as doctors, nurses, accountants, investigators, law enforcement personnel, attorneys, teachers, and others interested parties how to prevent fraud and abuse. In Indiana, the IAAAA and its affiliates, local Area Agencies on Aging (AAA), are the primary SMPs.

"If you are up to the challenge, consider volunteering your time and expertise to support the fight against fraud and abuse," said Melissa Durr, CEO of the IAAAA. "The future integrity of out health care system depends on you."

What do the volunteers do?

SMP volunteers work in their communities and in local senior centers to help identify deceptive health care practices. They help in the distribution of materials such as the Medicare Summary

Notice Guide and the Personal Health Care Journals and show consumers how to use them. SMP Volunteers can perform a variety of tasks which may include any or all of the following: training other volunteers, clerical functions, one-on-one counseling, respond to inquiries, community event management, conduct group educational sessions, fraud/abuse investigation and referral, research/respond to complex inquiries, and outreach development and marketing.

How are volunteers trained?
Volunteers are trained How to
Read the Medicare Summary
Notice and How to Protect, Detect
and Report Healthcare Fraud.
The Volunteer receives a
Certificate of Attendance and
SMP Volunteer Training Manual.
The SMP Project Manager
provides regular Training Updates
as needed.

How successful is this program? While it is difficult to accurately calculate the savings attributable to SMP activities, the Office of Inspector General's April 2008 outcomes tracking report of the SMP program indicates that since it's inception, the program has documented savings of more than \$104 million. The report states there are 10,000 active volunteers across the country. Between January and June 2008, there were 63 active volunteers in Indiana who have provided more than 350 hours of time assisting older adults and persons with disabilities.

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
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

stalks celery all diced. I cooked all of this with enough water to cover the vegetables and cooked till almost done. The potatoes need to stay firm when freezing. Drained off the water and added 1 can chicken broth 2 beef boullion cubes, 2 cans of evaporated milk and seasoned it with salt and pepper, 1 tablespoon garlic powder 1/2 stick butter and cooked till butter melted. Added 1/4 cup cornstarch with water for thickening cooking it on low till it thickened enough. I let this cool and bagged it and froze it in the servings for us. When serving it I let it thaw partially and add enough milk to make it the consistency we like. Heat it on medium heat to cook the potatoes.

I'm sure we will be enjoying this especially on ballgame nights when we want a quick meal.
