Would you love to learn more about gardening? If so, Spring 2026 is your chance! A Purdue Extension Gardener Training Course will be offered to Huntington and surrounding county residents Friday on mornings from 9 am to Noon, starting February 27th and ending June 5th, 2026. The program will be in collaboration with Miami and Wabash County Extension. Classes will rotate locations to places such as Salamonie Center, Interpretive Asherwood Nature Preserve, Courtney Schmidt. Miami Huntington and County Fairgrounds, and others.

The Master Gardener program is designed to build up your knowledge of home horticulture and train volunteers to assist with education horticultural programs Purdue for Extension. ### **SMART SNAP**

Make Braun's Indiana Healthy Again initiative, the Indiana Family and Social Administration beverages. Services (FSSA) is launching Smart SNAP, a bold new effort to sugar, honey, or other improve the health of Hoosiers by aligning SNAP benefits with healthier food choices. Beginning January 1, 2026, SNAP benefits can no longer be used to purchase sugary drinks or candy in Indiana.

This initiative is a direct response to alarming public health statistics: 66% of adult Hoosiers are overweight or obese, 44% eat fruit less than once daily, and 27% eat vegetables less than once daily. Among WIC toddlers aged 2-4, 16% are overweight and 15% are obese. Additionally, 25% of high schoolers and 32% of youth aged 10–17 are overweight obese.







## A MYSTERY TRIP TO KENTUCKY DAY 2, PT 2

by Larry Ryan When leaving the sky lift, we were already 90 minutes behind today's planned activity. Following highway # 11. it took us northwest to road # 77 and the entrance to the notorious, Red River Gorge. Dear Rusty: I'm trying to figure out if I should change my IRS filing status to "Married - Filing

In other words, if you have creditable healthcare coverage from an employer, you don't have to enroll in Medicare immediately at age 65.
