RAILROAD REPAIRS

The Warren Town Council has reached agreement with Wabash Central Railroad for repair and improvements to all four railroad crossings within the Town.

The SR 5 crossing will be repaired due to damage to the crossing arm mechanism caused by Town Employees while working on a utility project. Wabash Central will be in charge of the project with the Town responsible for the insurance and financial side of the repair. That issue had been in dispute for several months as Railroad officials had requested the Town totally handle the project.

The Wayne, Main, and Nancy Street crossings will be excavated and repaired by Wabash Central with the Town paving the approaches and the median areas between the rails.

A Wabash Central representative stated that the projects are scheduled to be completed by the end of June although a definite schedule has not been set. While being done, except for the SR 5 crossing, citizens should expect closures of streets in the areas of the crossings.

MAY 9 COUNCIL

The Warren Town Council met Monday evening, May 9 in Assembly Hall.

At 6:30 p.m. President Julia Glessner opened the meeting. She announced the opening of a Public Hearing in regard to a planning grant from the Office of Community and Rural Affairs for a study of the wastewater stormwater systems. Angela Huffman of Region IIIA, administrator for grant application, the summarized the grant proposal. There was no public input and the public hearing was closed.

President Glessner requested a moment of silence following the Pledge of Allegiance in honor of recently deceased Bill Cartwright, President of the Council.

Council approved Resolution

1-2011. This concerned a local match for the OCRA Planning

Marshal Spitler was instructed to check properties for nuisance violations.

Clerk-Treasurer Marilyn Morrison reported work continued on finalizing a contract with UNISON for that company's buy out of the AT&T lease of space on the Eleventh Street water tower for wireless communication equipment.

Morrison and Day reported that some changes are being made for the layout of the Salamonie Summer Festival. The stage will be moved to the corner of Second Street and Main Street. No events will be planned on State Road 5 on Sunday. The highway will be reopened on Saturday night. A festival committee member is scheduled to be present at the next regular Council meeting.

Zachary Tolen was introduced. He was attending the meeting to meet requirements for a Community badge through the Boy Scouts.

A Public Hearing for closure of an unimproved portion of Fourth Street has been

rescheduled for the next regular Council meeting on June 13.

Marshal Spitler presented detailed plans for a program for removal of feral cats. This involves the local veterinary and Huntington County Animal Control. The cats would be trapped and then neutered or spayed at a cost of \$40 each and placed with individuals who have expressed interest in barn cats. Council approved and the program is expected to begin the week of June 13. Articles will be placed in Warren Weekly as well as the June 1 billing newsletter.

An administrative meeting was set for May 10 to meet with a representative of the Wabash Central Railroad for information regarding repairs to crossings within the town.

President Glessner summarized the certification from the Circuit Court Clerk regarding the death of president and member Bill Cartwright. According to election law, a replacement must be appointed within thirty days of that certification. A special meeting was set for Monday, May 16 at 10 a.m. to review letters of interest in taking a position on Council

and possibly filling the vacancy.

A not-for-profit charity league from Bluffton had requested permission for use of Tower Park diamond for three tournaments, May 28, July 9 and July 23. The group does not allow alcohol and would have security personnel available. Council requested more information and asked that Warren Baseball League be contacted regarding the dates.

Jeff Souder, president of the Warren Area Chamber of Commerce was in attendance. He reported that a recent fund raiser for the Downtown Park Project had been successful. Souder also represents the Town on the Huntington County United Economic Development Board of Directors. He gave general information in regard to a company wishing to locate near the Markle or Warren exits of 169.

Morrison reported that a fax machine had been purchased for the office.

Day presented Council with a list of summer projects for the Utility/Street Departments. Mosquito spraying should begin soon. He reported he had been unable to find a used unit for spraying. A cost of

\$5,800 from Mug-Bug for a new unit was submitted to Council. They approved the purchase. Also the 1994 John Deere mower was reported not usable. A used mower with just over 100 hours had been purchased from McCune for \$8500. Original cost had been \$11,000. Purchase of the mower was included in the 2011 budget. President Glessner had been contacted and approved the purchase. Council had already budgeted \$15,000 for the purchase. Council approved.

In his report Marshal Spitler noted that the 2011 Tahoe is being retrofitted and is expected to be on the street May 11. It will remain unmarked. Huntington County **Emergency** Management indicated interest in the purchasing the 02 Tahoe begin replaced. Council asked that the vehicle be appraised and asked Spitler to meet with representatives of that agency on a purchase price. As the unit would be sold to another government agency, bids would not be necessary.

Morrison reported that preparation of the 2012 Municipal Budget will begin within the month and that the Department personnel should submit their requests. She also reported that there will be a drop in certain funds due to overpayment by the State which must be repaid beginning in 2012 and declining income tax dollars.

SPECIAL MEETING MINUTES

The Town Council of the Town of Warren met Monday, May 16, 2011 at Assembly Hall, Council Meeting Room, 131 N. Wayne Street, in accordance with rules of Council and applicable law.

Those present were: Town Council, Barb Trosper, Ron Boxell, Julia Glessner, Clerk-Treasurer, Marilyn Morrison; Employees, Curt Day, Jason Caley; and others.

President Glessner called the meeting to order at 10:00 am by announcing that discussion and voting would be conducted to fill the vacancy on Council created by the death of Bill Cartwright. Glessner explained the ranking system to be used with the person getting the highest score to be selected. Council members concurred and ranked the six individuals who had applied: Marvin Foland, David Scheib, Danny DeWeese, Michael Yoder, John Gamble and Tracey Brown. Following compilation

of the scores, Tracey Brown of 1340 Halliday Drive was selected to serve the remainder of the term which will end in 2014.

Discussion with Pete Bell of Wabash Central railroad on repairing crossings within the Town had been held. Boxell moved, seconded by Glessner, that the Town would cover paving, approximately \$5500, of intersections so that Wabash Central would repair three crossings instead of the two being planned. Day requested consideration of purchase of a covered utility trailer to be used at project sites. A used trailer had been offered to the Town at the cost of \$4000 with a projected value of \$5000. The trailer had previously been owned by Bill Cartwright and had already been outfitted with shelves. Following discussion, Glessner moved, Trosper seconded, purchase of the trailer by MVH and the three utilities. The was approved motion unanimously.

Discussed was notice of a public auction of a utility building at 114 E First Street. Trosper moved, seconded by Boxell, that two appraisals be sought for the building for consideration of purchase. The motion was approved unanimously.

Discussion was held concerning the CAFO operation being constructed within one and a half miles of the Town. Reviewed were documents detailing the operation and the requirements for building in addition to an application for a special exception to allow a flag lot. Following discussion, it was determined that a letter be drafted stating concerns of impact on potential development, both residential and business (industrial) in the area, impact on the Town as a whole due to potential odor related issues, and impact of

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potential contamination on area streams by land application or by incident.

A letter requesting payment for expenses related to a power outage at the Heartland Saturn in the amount of \$34,878 was received by that company.

Following discussion and by consensus, it was determined that a response letter be drafted by Morrison and Day outlining refusal to pay to be submitted to the Council for review at the next Regular Meeting.

General discussion was held.

There being no further business to come before Council, the meeting was adjourned.



It was in the autumn of 1889 that people were told that Warren was to have natural gas for fuel and lighting purposes and a man was opening an office in the downtown area. It was also said that the company would need a large force of men to dig trenches and lay pipes. The pay was to be \$1.25 for a ten hour day and at that time the wage was considered good pay and there were many applicants. The company was the Huntington Light and Fuel Company and the man in charge was James O'Neal.

The announcement came near of breaking up the high school where a very large class of young men and women had entered the freshmen class. No ambitious youngster would waste his time in going to high school when he could make twelve and half cents an hour for ten hours every day swinging a pick and shovel. The next Monday, there were many vacant seats in the high school. At that time there were no compulsory education laws or any restrictions against working for wages.

As the days went by, the pipelines reached further and further along the streets and the coal oil lamps at the street corners were replaced by gas lights which threw their beams much farther than the old kerosene burners. There will be more on this subject next week.

NEW FUEL REGULATIONS

Agricultural producers storing more than 1,320 gallons of fuel or other petroleum products on their farms soon will need a written plan for preventing and handling spills. The plans are covered in U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) regulation amendments that take effect Nov. 10.

This EPA regulation, known as the federal Spill Prevention, Control and Countermeasure (SPCC) was initially adopted in 1974. It has been amended over the years.

Fred Whitford, Purdue Pesticide Program Coordinator, said that the EPA will ask for a plan if they respond to a spill on a farm. The EPA may also ask ag producers to see their plan if they are visiting the farm on an unrelated matter.

"The SPCC's basic intent is to make sure growers who store large amounts of these products are putting in place measures that will protect the area around their properties, specifically groundwater and surface water," Whitford said. "With this regulation EPA is saying that we need to be thinking about fuel storage as much as pesticide and fertilizer storage. It doesn't take much oil or gas to pollute water."

Under the new amendments, only petroleum products stored in stationary tanks and containers of at least 55 gallons are counted toward the regulated total. Gasoline, diesel fuel and oil in tractors, trucks and other vehicular machinery are exempt.

Farmers would not be required to write a SPCC plan if their more than 1,320 gallons of petroleum products are stored on separate farms, so long as no single farm stores the regulated minimum, Whitford said.

"If you're between 1,321 gallons and 10,000 gallons, you can self-certify your written plan. If you're at greater than 10,000 gallons, the plan has to be written by a certified professional engineer. The EPA is looking to divide the smaller everyday users of products from those that store much larger quantities."

Farmers can expect to spend

between \$2,000 and \$4,000 to hire an engineer to write a SPCC plan, Whitford said.

The plan includes such information as how petroleum products are stored, the location of storage units, the farm's topography and what steps would be taken in the event of a spill. The document is kept on the farm; EPA does not receive a copy.

Farmers can learn more about the regulation by visiting the EPA's SPCC website, at http://www.epa.gov/osweroe1/content/spcc/, which also includes links for farmers and a template for writing a SPCC plan.

General information on the SPCC and fuel and oil storage is available in Purdue Extension publication PPP-73, Aboveground Petroleum Tanks: A Pictorial Guide. The publication, written by Whitford and other university and industry co-authors, addresses risks related to fuel storage and ways to reduce those risks.
